OTTAWA (CP) - A Prime Minister's Island Conservative has been told in the Commons a farm credit corporation supervisor will be appointed whose sole jurisdiction will be the province.

J. Angus MacLean (PC - Queens) asked in the Commons whether the P.E.I. Minister of the Farm Credit Corporation and the supervisor on the island will not be moved to Moncton, N.B.

Bruce S. Beer (L-Peel), parliament secretary to Agriculture Minister Hays, said a decision was taken in 1961 to centralize the operations of the corporation in the Atlantic provinces in Moncton. In line with this a supervisor has been moved to Moncton from the island. But he said a new supervisor will be appointed to P.E.I. with responsibility only for the province.
