

Reports 600 Eggs Laid By Pheasants Imported From U.S.

Mr. Frank Woodside, caretaker of the 27 pheasants which arrived in Summerside from Wisconsin, U.S.A., on April 23, stated last evening at the regular meeting of the Prince County Branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association, that they have laid approximately 600 eggs, with this week being the most productive to date.

Discussion on releasing a number of the older pheasants culminated in a motion to have member sportsmen interview farmers who own suitable areas for liberating the birds, seeking permission and to report back to the committee who will investigate the area as to its suitability.

When president R. J. Rayner, who presided, stated that it has been decided to release all of the pheasants west of Summerside, members of the Borden sub-branch objected and were informed by the president that this was being done because it had been pointed out that pheasants released east of the narrow neck of land that runs for some distance in the Summerside area would be slow in migrating westward. However a motion was approved that a percentage of the birds be released east of Summerside.

The meeting went on record as approving a one year closed season on pheasants for Prince County and also that particulars be procured concerning the Tyne Valley dam site which is reported to be for sale, and that these be turned over to the executive of the branch who are empowered to act as they see fit.

TO RELEASE QUAIL.

The meeting decided to release all quail (62) now being raised at Kensington and to return the birds now in captivity to the game farm in Cape Breton to help meet the Provincial associations commitments to them.

Discussion also centered on the setting up of a commission comprised of association members and members of the department of Industry and Natural Resources, through which any changes pertaining to hunting and fishing on P.E.I. would have to be approved before being presented to the government. This was left to the executive of the Prince County branch to act on as they wish.

President Rayner revealed that the annual field day will be held at Daltry sometime near the end of May and that the proposed sportsmen show, which was to have been held in Summerside and Charlottetown this year for two or three days, has been cancelled for this year, also that the Maritime Wild Life Federation meeting will be held in Shediac next month.

Over 30 members and interested sportsmen attended the meeting, after which interesting films were shown by Mr. Ben Beck.

2ND GAME TONIGHT

Maroons-Royals Nursing Bruises

CALGARY (CP)—Winnipeg Maroons and Montreal Royals nursed their bruises Thursday in preparation for the second game of the best-of-nine Edinburg trophy hockey series, scheduled at Edmonton tonight.

The clubs were scheduled to make the four-hour trip to the Alberta capital today and will return after the game to Calgary for the third game in the east-west professional hockey playoff.

Royals, travel-weary when they lost 6-3 to Warriors in the opening game here Wednesday night, were patching up an eye cut suffered by Calum MacKay, one of the Montreal scorers in the first game. Ron Ingram also was nursing injuries but it was expected both would be ready for action in Edmonton.

Meanwhile, coach Alf Pike

of Warriors expressed confidence Winnipeg can come up with victory, to give the Western Hockey League the Edinburg Trophy for the second time in the three years it has been up for competition. Calgary Stampede of the WHL won it two years ago and Shawinigan Falls of the Quebec League took it last year.

Pike said Royals, who won the Quebec league championship by defeating Shawinigan Falls in six games in the best-of-seven final, were obviously tired after the opening period.

"They'll be a different club out there Friday night and this looks like a series that could go down to the wire," said Pike. He was confident, however, his club could gain the upper hand.

The clubs will move to Winnipeg to play out the series after the Saturday night game in Calgary.

Pacific Coast League Ball Makes Debut In Vancouver

VANCOUVER (CP)—Pacific Coast League baseball makes its debut tonight in Vancouver, the city with the smallest stadium and the biggest hopes in the league.

Stern critics are tempted to say Vancouver Mounties haven't shown much else this year but hopes. In 15 league games so far this season, the Mounties have won but five. They're last in the standings.

The fact isn't likely to daunt a capacity crowd expected to fill the 9,200 seats at Capilano Stadium and push out behind ropes in the outfield to see the Mounties play San Francisco Seals.

General manager Cedric Tallis was all optimism Thursday.

"I certainly believe Vancouver will outdraw most other teams in the league," Tallis said. "And I think we ought to finish up one-two-three with Portland and Seattle on attendance."

MOUNTIES IN SLUMP

The Mounties home opener marks the first time the Pacific Coast League has crossed the international boundary. The eight-team circuit has long been made up only of teams from California, Oregon and Washington states.

One of the team's main assets is its veteran field manager, Frank Lefty O'Doul. In point of service, he has all other league managers looking like youngsters.

He first began managing in 1935 steering San Francisco to four pennants in the 17 seasons he was its manager.

The last-place Baltimore Orioles ended New York Yankees' five-game, winning streak Thursday and dumped the losers out of the American League lead on a percentage basis.

While the Yanks bowed to the Orioles 7-5, the idle Chicago White Sox edged out front by 22 percentage points, .800 to .778. Actually, on a won-loss basis, the Yanks still are on top by one game.

Shoddy defence and inept pitching by the Yanks helped the Orioles to a five-run inning in the sixth. Tommy Byrne, Tom Morgan and Bob Grim walked the plank before Jim Konstanty finally shut off the scoring.

Home runs by Bill Gardner, ex-odos, former Yankee farmhand, were big blows in the winner's nine-hit attack. Gardner also slashed a double in the big inning.

DOUBLE ERROR

A double error gave Baltimore the two runs that sent them ahead in the big inning. With the Yanks leading 5-4 and men on first and third and one out, pinch hitter Dave Pope grounded to Bill Skowron, who threw high to second, pulling Jerry Lumpe off the bag for one error. The shortstop then threw the ball into the dugout, allowing two runs to score.

The Yanks hopped on Jim Wilson for four runs in the first inning. Joe Collins' triple with the bases loaded accounted for three and Lumpe's single brought in the fourth.

Cleveland clobbered Kansas City 14-2 to reach the .500 mark and third place in the league standings. Chico Carrasquel hit a grand slam homer for the tribe and drove in seven runs, while Harry Simpson homered for the A.S. The wallop was one of the four hits off early Wynn, who now owns a 2-0 record.

Big Ten Head Puts Ohio State U. On Probation

CHICAGO (AP)—Big Ten commissioner K. L. Tug Wilson Thursday put Ohio State University on probation for one year for giving financial assistance to football players.

Terms of the probation include:

- Ohio State cannot under any circumstances represent the Big Ten in the Rose Bowl football game until probation is lifted.
- The university must supervise the work program of athletes diligently.
- Coach Woody Hayes must comply with all rules of the Big Ten regarding financial assistance to athletes.

Wilson said Ohio State would be "in a state of probationary membership" in the western conference for "no less than one year."

Wilson also ruled that no athletes who benefited from "irregularities" in Ohio State's part-time work program can be eligible for participation in intercollegiate sports "until I have approved satisfactory evidence they have actually repaid fully in services the wages received."

TIPS ON GOLFING

Trouble In The Rough

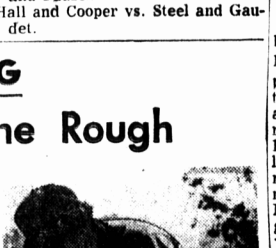
Golfers have a talent for "Doing it the hard way," trying to hit wood shots or putt out of a sand trap are good examples. The percentage is all against success with such shots. Why? Simply because these shots call for almost perfect conditions, including a good lie of the ball and extremely good luck in striking the right spots on its way out of the sand. On top of this, the player must strike the ball just right, which means that these shots call for much more skill than those played with more suitable clubs.

Every player who tries to get away with these shots did so at one time or another. Worse yet he may just be dreaming of success with them. I'm not claiming that they are absolutely impossible, simply insisting that they are most impractical.

Invariably it is some error in your planning or executing of the shot that places your ball in the sand trap. The hazard was arranged as a penalty for such errors. You're both reasonable and smart when you face this fact. Also, it's smart to regard all shots out of hazards as Recovery shots. In such shots the main point is to recover from the handicap of a bad lie without incurring more penalties.

The best recovery shot you can play out of a sand trap is the explosion type. Due to the design of clubs manufactured for shots out of sand a minimum of skill is required to use them successfully. The wide flange on the bottom of the clubhead enables you to bang down into the sand just back of the ball to make the ball jump up quickly.

This clubhead can strike the sand with a descending blow,

Our used car lot on busy afternoons often resembles a teenagers' live contest. A lot of people are around jumping on bumpers to test shock absorbers.

Everybody knows you should bounce on a car's bumpers to test the shocks but I find a lot of people (and, confidentially, a lot of automobile people too) who don't know exactly what to look for.

The job of shock absorbers is to stop the springs from bouncing the car up and down when you go over a bump. There are no shock absorbers on a bed spring, which gives an adventurous youngster the wonderful game of bouncing up and down from a single leap.

You may remember before the war one of the auto manufacturers fastened a light on the top of one of his cars and on the rear wheel. Then they opened the lens of a camera and ran the car across a bumpy field. The light on the wheel made a line like a graph gone crazy, but the light on the car roof made a line that was almost flat.

So, when you find a car that looks like what you want, stand firmly on the front bumper, bounce the car down and then jump off. The car whose shocks are working properly should go up and down once and then stop.
