Germany and England.

WE were assured last year that if the Canadian Pacific Railway Company obtained a loan of \$30,000,000, they would be in a position to finish and equip the road in spite of all obstacles, and in defiance of all enemies.

Parliamentary Notes.

THE SCOTT ACT.

Mr. Jamieson, M. P., has introduced a bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act. He explained that the bill provides that it shall not be necessary in future to produce in each case of prosecution under the act a copy of the Official Gazette containing the order-in-council under which the act is declared to be in force in the county where the prosecution is pending.

MR. TUPPER ON THE MIXERS AND MUDDLERS.

Mr. Tupper, in the debate on the Budget, pointed out that Cartwright remained as he always had been, a mixer and a muddler, a deft creator; that if in England they knew Cartwright as we did in Canada, no harm would follow from his attacks on the country.

THE LICENSE ACT.

Sir John Macdonald announced in the House of Commons on Monday, that the Dominion Government has determined to appeal to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council with reference to the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada as to the constitutionality of the Liquor License Act of 1883.

CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY RETURNS.

Among the motions, a few days ago, was one by Mr. Hession for a statement showing the number of returns ordered by the Commons relating to the Canada Pacific Railway since the date of the contract with the Government. Mr. Hession said hundreds of returns were asked for and never used, even by those who called for them.

MONETARY MATTERS.

Sir Richard Cartwright moved for an address to the Governor-General for copies of all orders in council, correspondence, etc., in possession of the Government relative to the retirement of the five per cent. consolidated loan maturing on the 1st January, 1885.

Sir Leonard said the information would be brought down. As to the great risks, he (Tilley) would place his record of the last five years as Finance Minister against Cartwright's record and leave it to the people of Canada to say which they preferred.

There was some good speaking at the Associated Chambers of Commerce last night, and the toast of "The Colonies," proposed by Mr. Forster, was received with the marked cordiality which it is nowadays always certain to evoke at public meetings.

Advices lately received convey the intelligence that the Norwegian winter cod-fishery, has turned out well. Up to the 17th ult., the catch amounted to seven million dollars. For the corresponding periods of 1884 and 1883 the catch was three millions; of 1882, one and a half millions; and of 1881, seven and a quarter millions.

Parnell has issued a manifesto advising all municipalities of Ireland to observe a respectful neutrality regarding the approaching visit of the Prince of Wales.

A By Law Respecting Milk Vendors.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:—

1st. Every person publicly selling milk in this City, shall first obtain from the Mayor thereof a License as a Milk Vendor, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such License upon receiving the License Fee hereinafter mentioned.

2nd. The said License Fee shall be \$15.

3rd. The City Collector for the time being shall be and is hereby appointed Inspector of all milk offered for sale in this City.

4th. It shall and may be lawful for the said Inspector to examine and inspect all milk so offered for sale, wherever the same may be offered.

5th. It shall be the duty of every person, keeping or offering milk for sale, whether on the streets or in shops or private dwellings, to furnish to and permit the said Inspector to take samples thereof for examination or analysis, and any person hindering the said Inspector in the discharge of his duty, or refusing to permit him to examine and inspect, or to take samples of such milk, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against, and incur the penalties of this By Law.

6th. It shall be the duty of the said Inspector, whenever he has reason to believe any milk to be adulterated with water or any other substance, to procure a sample thereof to be analyzed, and to prosecute all persons who may be found selling, offering, or keeping for sale, any adulterated milk.

7th. No person shall expose for sale, or sell anywhere in this City, milk adulterated with water, or with any deleterious substance.

8th. No person shall expose for sale, or publicly sell milk in this City without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned.

9th. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By Law shall, upon conviction in the City Court of the Stipendiary Magistrate, &c., &c., on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the said Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs; and in default of payment thereof, it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the said City for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid; provided always that nothing in this By Law shall be construed to require persons selling milk in stores or from their private dwellings to take out the License above mentioned.

A By Law to Amend the By Law to Regulate and Compel the Removing of Snow.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. Section one of the By Law of this City, Chapter 21, entitled a By Law to Regulate and Compel the Removing of Snow is hereby amended by striking out the words therein "and so much of Water Street, Richmond Street, Grafton Street and Kent Street as lie between Pownall Street and Prince Street;" and inserting in lieu thereof the words—"and so much of all the streets in said City running east and west as lie between Pownall Street and Weymouth Street."
