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surrender was imminent, he reorganized the remainder of his platoon and successfully withdrew, bringing with him one wounded man.

He was awarded a distinguished platoon of another company and welded the two platoons into an effective fighting unit to stop further advances of the enemy.

Bright, the citation said, fought his way through Communist infiltrators to carry reliable information about the attack to a neighboring company. On the way back he brought a new radio set and ammunition for his own platoon so it could continue fighting.

Cloutier's citation said he placed himself in a position from which he reported the progress of battle to his commanding officer despite heavy artillery and mortar fire. He organized two groups from his company to probe an area which had been overrun, and information obtained was credited with being responsible for the success of a counter-attack which restored Allied positions.

Highly Successful South Shore Musical Festival Concluded At S'side

About 25 schools were represented in singing, speaking, or piano playing competition at the 5th annual South Shore Musical Festival which concluded at Summerside on Saturday evening. This two-day festival surpassed all previous records in quality and attendance.

The competitions were conducted in the auditorium of the Summerside High School, and brought together an exceptional fine display of talent that won high praise from the adjudicators, and warm applause from the large numbers of interested spectators who attended.

The music of the bag pipes accompanying three classes of folk dancing added still further to the pleasant program provided on Saturday evening, and which was presided over by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell.

For Mr. William Jones, Tryon, it was the climax of another year's work in teaching music to pupils in at least eight of the schools which took part in the competitions. Mr. Jones also had the unusual distinction of instructing all six choral groups, some with 40 to 50 persons, who took part in the Women's chorus, and mixed voice chorus.

Several of the contestants expressed the opinion that without the untiring work of Mr. and Mrs. Jones, this festival might not attain anything comparable to its present success.

One of the outstanding performers in the music classes, 20 years and under, was Miss Ruth Boswell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Boswell, Victoria, who won first prize in both piano and vocal solo classes.

Her condition at the time had not been considered at all serious and news of her death came as a shock to the Sisters of the Convent here as well as her many friends and pupils in Summerside.

She was a daughter of the late John Bolger and Catherine (Hogan) Bolger, of Charlottetown, and is survived by two sisters, Miss Mary Ann Bolger and Mrs. Gertrude Evans, both of Ottawa.

Sister St. John had been a member of the Congregation of Notre Dame approximately 44 years ago and had taught for many years at St. Mary's Convent, Providence R. I., and St. Patrick's Academy, Montreal. The funeral service will be sung this morning in the Chapel of the Mother House, Montreal, with the interment in the Community Centre there.
