

PC Presentation Blasted By Boundaries Chairman

Jack Kenny, president of the P.E.I. Progressive Conservative Association, received sharp criticism from commission chairman Justice George J. Tweedy Thursday morning for the presentation he made to the P.E.I. Electoral Boundaries Commission, holding a public hearing at the Law Courts Building in Charlottetown.

Mr. Kenny, who earlier notified the commission that he would present a brief in connection with commission recommendations that four new electoral districts be formed in this province yesterday in a written submission told the commission that the association would make representations at hearings scheduled for Prince and Kings Counties.

Commission chairman, Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, said he was "surprised" at Mr. Kenny's submission.

Judge Tweedy asked "couldn't you have disclosed to us at yesterday's hearing that you would not be going ahead today?"

"You requested that we adjourn until today and now you tell us there is no representation. If you are going to ignore, or try to run, this commission, you will have to change your ways. The commission was set up by the federal government and has a job to do. Seven people are involved here at considerable expense and you have stopped the business."

ASKS INTENTION
Judge Tweedy pointed out that the association had two months in which to prepare a brief. He told Mr. Kenny "it looks as though you prepared this yesterday. What is your intention?"

Man Gets Two Years For Assaulting Wife

John Robert MacDonald, 28, was arraigned before Queen's County Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., in Magistrate's Court Friday afternoon on a charge of theft under \$50.

The accused, a resident of Cornwall, pleaded guilty to stealing 29-67-pound bags of cement which was owned by the department of highways and he drew a fine of \$50 and costs or 30 days. Counsel for the accused was Bert Campbell.

Eric Lionel Lowther, also of Cornwall, was charged with a similar offence and was remanded to June 28 for plea with bail to stand.

The case of John Henry Gibbs of Grand Trappee was dismissed. The accused, charged with

care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired, was convicted by John J. Holmes.

TWO YEAR TERM
A two-year term in Queen's County jail was imposed on James D. Longpue of New Kensington Road for assaulting his wife.

A violation of the lobster fishery regulations, cost Stanley McCabe of 18 Kirkwood Drive \$10 and costs or 5 days.

A similar fine was imposed upon Wilfred Vernon Watts of Hampshire when he pleaded guilty to parking on the highway in a position likely to cause danger to other persons using the highway.

The case of John Donald Kennedy, 305 Euston Street, was adjourned to July 16 when the accused, charged with driving without due care and attention, is scheduled to appear for trial.

A resident of Belle River and charged with illegal possession of liquor were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days while another person from Breadalbane was arraigned on a similar charge and fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Little Theatre Guild Needs New Home

The Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild will have to remove its belongings from the old Spring Park School, which is to be torn down next month.

The Guild has costumes, furniture, and flats stored in the old Spring Park School, which will be removed within the next week.

The city is calling for tenders for the purchase of the building, and the drama group must clear its property from the school, within a week.

However, the Guild has a problem: it needs a new home. Members of the group have been searching the city for temporary or permanent accommodation for their property, but as yet have been unsuccessful.

President Arthur MacLean says what they are looking for is a barn, garage or similar empty building.

Urban Electoral District Sought

The P.E.I. Electoral Boundaries Commission met in Charlottetown yesterday to hear briefs by the provincial Liberal association which asked that an entirely urban electoral district be created in Prince Edward Island.

The commission is meeting to hear briefs on its recommendation that P.E.I. be split into four electoral districts — Cardigan, Egmont, Hillsborough and Malpeque.

The association submission was made by John Nicholson, who was accompanied by association president W. R. Jenkins.

Mr. Nicholson said that Charlottetown and Charlottetown-Royal should be a separate electoral district. Pointing out that urban and rural problems differ, Mr. Nicholson said "if we have an urban district in the province, it is certainly Charlottetown and Charlottetown-Royal."

The commission recommendation was that Charlottetown and Charlottetown-Royal be included in the proposed Hillsborough district which also contains Lots 32, 33, 34, 35, 36 and 48.

HAS SUGGESTED
Mr. Nicholson suggested that the lots could be absorbed by the proposed Cardigan and Malpeque districts, and the districts would still have the population required by the federal legislation covering redistribution.

Mr. Nicholson, on behalf of the Liberal association, said he hoped that no one would object to the commission's recommendation that the dual riding of Queens be abolished. He said "I hope no one will be so bold as to suggest the dual riding be retained. If the commission does nothing else, it will be long remembered for eliminating the dual riding."

In connection with the commission's proposed names for the electoral districts — Cardigan, Egmont, Hillsborough and Malpeque — Mr. Nicholson suggested that Kings would be a more suitable name than Cardigan. Malpeque should be called Bedouque; Hillsborough should be Charlottetown; and Egmont should be Malpeque.

Mr. Nicholson has advised the commission that the Liberal association will make further representation at next month's hearings in Prince and Kings Counties.
