North Rustico Has 105 Donors

Residents of North Rustico maintained their high record of attendance at the Red Cross blood donor clinic there last evening when 85 of the 105 who registered were from North Rustico itself. The other 20 represented the following districts in the surrounding area: South Rustico, Cymbric, Cavendish, Mayfield, Oyster Bed Bridge, Wheatley River, New Glasgow, Stanley Bridge, Hope River, Rusticville and Glasgow Road. Splendid assistance for the mobile team was provided by a large number of boys who are Junior Red Cross members of Stella Maris School and who had all the equipment unloaded and set up in record time and then dismantled at the end as if by "magic". Refreshments and workers were provided jointly by the Avonlea Women's Institute and the North Rustico sub-division of the Catholic Women's League. Several gentlemen were kept busy all evening transporting donors to and from the clinic and in this way contributed considerably to the success of the clinic which was under the able leadership of Rev. Eric Robin, P.P.

It now remains to the residents of Long Creek and Summerside and their surrounding areas to keep up the fine record established by the centres which have had their hold so far this week when they held their clinics this afternoon and evening and in this way make it possible to report that the Province has had the highest number of donors ever registered here in a four-day period.

Urges Help For Villages In New Army Camp Area

OTTAWA, (CP) - A. J. Brooks (PC - Royal) Wednesday urged government help to villages near the army's big new Camp Gagetown in New Brunswick which had suffered from the establishment of the camp.

Mr. Brooks, speaking in the Commons throne speech debate, referred to villages in a 20-mile stretch between the camp and the St. John river.

The village had depended on the area lumbered for the camp for trade, food and dairy products. Lumber mills now must close and storekeepers had lost more than half of their trade.

"There is a very grave debt owing the people of this area," Mr. Brooks said. Frederickton and Saint John were getting the benefits of the camp although neither had suffered.

"This area should receive first consideration," Mr. Brooks suggested that homes for service men at the camps should be built at the village of Gagetown, one of the communities most severely affected.
