Report Issued On Cereal Varieties For P. E. Island

For several years now the Dominion Experimental Station at Charlottetown has conducted variety tests of oats, barley and wheat at a number of country points as well as at the Station. The results of these tests, says Mr. R. B. MacLaren, provide a pretty reliable guide as to the most suitable varieties. The following summary has been released officially:

Oats - Among oats for almost all districts Abegweit is considered first choice. Since it was introduced in 1947, Abegweit has proved so popular with growers that it is already the leading variety in the province. It is moderately resistant to both leaf and stem rusts, matures medium early and the straw is of medium length and strength. Average yields of a large number of tests show it to be slightly higher than Erban and the threshed grain is more attractive. The registered strain of Abegweit, which should be available in limited quantity for 1953 seeding, is a considerably better yielding than the original.

Erban - Moderately resistant to leaf rust but not to stem rust, is a close second to Abegweit in popularity. It matures about 3 to 5 days earlier than Abegweit and is a bit more resistant to lodging. Erban is sometimes criticized for being "taily" but the actual amount of kernel per hundred lb. of grain is quite good.

Ajax is probably the best in the early maturing class. It is moderately resistant to stem rust and the straw, though fine, is moderately strong. The threshed grain is often thin and unattractive but like Erban the percentage of kernel per hundred lb. of grain is good. Ajax is not recommended for general use but where early maturity is essential it is the best choice.

Banner and Victory - Both late maturing and lacking in disease resistance still occupy considerable acreage in the Province. They are good varieties but over a period of years do not give as high an average yield as Abegweit or Erban.

Carrier and Alaska - High quality early varieties, continue to be grown in some areas. Carrier in particular seems popular. Because of early maturity they often escape serious rust injury and of course low hull percentage is a point in their favour. However under average conditions the yield is too light to compete with Abegweit, Erban or Ajax.

Barley - Among the barley varieties, Charlottetown No. 80 is still recommended as first choice and it is too well known to require description. For those who prefer a six-rowed variety Montcalm is recommended. It is smooth awned with tall, moderately strong straw. Like most six-rowed barleys it does not usually thresh easily under our conditions and should be well ripened before cutting.

Wheat - Far too many varieties of wheat are grown in P. E. I. A recent survey lists fourteen, several of them decidedly inferior to those at present recommended.

Cascade - A semi-hard, white wheat with good rust resistance has given high yields since its introduction a few years ago. Its chief fault is the habit of sprouting very readily in the stock and when harvest weather is unfavourable it must be watched carefully. Strictly speaking, Cascade is a feed wheat but it does make acceptable flour. Recent, a high quality milling wheat, quite resistant to rust, is perhaps the most widely grown variety in the province. It requires good land for satisfactory yields and will nearly always be outyielded by Cascade or Acadia.

Acadia, a new introduction, may well prove to be the leading variety in the Province within a few years. It has been under test at the Experimental Station for several years and each year has been at or near the top in yield. It is a headed wheat, resistant to rust with medium tall strong straw. Acadia was developed for use in Eastern Canada and appears to be well adapted to Maritime conditions.

The surveys indicate that far too many varieties of oats and wheat are grown in the Province," says the report. "It would be unreasonable to suggest that only one variety of oats should be grown. No variety is good enough to meet the approval of all growers. On the other hand it is unfortunate that more than 15 different kinds of oats are grown in an area as small as Prince Edward Island.

Farm Briefs Presented To Legislature

Special guests of the Legislature yesterday afternoon were representatives of the Federation of Agriculture and of the Agricultural Council with Mr. Charles Leo, speaking for the former and Mr. F. M. Nash presenting the brief for the Council.

The Legislature met in early session at 2 p.m. to receive the briefs and members listened to the very timely subjects introduced until late afternoon. Last night when the House held its first evening session all speakers referred to the remarks of the agricultural men and offered congratulations on the interest shown in the welfare of the Island by those who prepared the briefs.

Premier J. Walter Jones suggested that the excellent ideas advanced could be presented to the people in perhaps a better form. He advised the representatives of the Farmers Federation and of the Agricultural Council to get into politics "and get a constituency of your own" in order to help the Government in aiding farmers.

Mr. Roland MacDonald, Southport, said that he did not blame youngsters for leaving farms here as they "were boiling with exuberance" and you could not keep young people on a farm unless some entertainment were provided for them.
