Inter-Parliamentary Talks

Washington, U.S.A.: A vivid new chapter in Canadian-U.S. relations was written here recently, when nine of our Parliamentarians met with eight members of the U.S. Congress to plan regular consultations between legislators of the two nations.

It was agreed that about 24 Canadians will meet with a similar number of U.S. delegates, at least twice each year, at conferences to be held in various cities alternatively in Canada and in the U.S.

The first of these inter-Parliamentary meetings will be held next June in Ottawa, and will include a visit to see the new St. Lawrence Seaway in operation.

The purpose of these Canadian-U.S. get-togethers, our Commons Speaker Roland Michener told me, is to create the means whereby legislators of the two countries could discuss problems of common concern.

None of these subjects was explored in the least detail at this first meeting, which was essentially an organizational meeting and get-together occasion.

Forecasting Without Fear

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Advice For Mothers-To-Be

By Herman N. Sandesen, M.D. JUST about everybody has advice on what an expectant mother should do before the birth of her baby.

Afterpains are caused by the relaxing and contracting of the uterus. Women who have had previous children are more apt to experience them than those who have just become mothers for the first time.

TO GET RELIEF Sometimes, however, the pain might be had enough to require relief. In that case, aspirin or some similar preparation may be all that you'll need.

EXTRA LIQUID If you nurse your baby, you may need extra milk and fruit juices. If you don't nurse, your doctor may restrict the amount of liquids you can drink.

There will be a vaginal discharge for several days, or weeks following birth. At first it will be red, then it will change to yellow and finally to white.

One more thing: generally, it is more difficult to become pregnant during the months a mother is nursing a baby, but it is not impossible.

QUESTION AND ANSWER A.G.B.: Can you tell me the prognosis of a patient with gastric cancer for the past 10 years?

ANSWER: The prognosis has improved in certain areas in which physicians have maintained an optimistic and aggressive attitude.

that there will be no withdrawal from Berlin except in the context of German reunification under free elections—a concept that Russia approved in principle at the Geneva summit conference of 1955.

POLISH FEARS It also sought to reassure Russia and its satellites against any revival of the German militarism they profess to dread.

Should a reunited Germany decide to join NATO, Lloyd said his program would renounce military advantage to the West by barring any eastward move by Western troops or NATO defences beyond their present positions.

Lloyd also proposed an East German demilitarized zone—a buffer area vaguely along the lines proposed by Polish Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki—and a cut in troops and arms on both sides of the zone.

Despite the best intentions in the world, parliament will run far past the Government's deadline for ending the session and Members of parliament will mourn the arrival of hot weather and vow never again.

Western governments are deep in study of the possibilities of counter-proposals to Russia's new-old formula for German peace treaty conference.

They see Russia's weekend diplomatic note as essentially a rehash of old ideas—hammering on the theme of a neutralized Germany, meaning that West Germany would turn its back on NATO and be forbidden nuclear weapons of any kind.

The only new aspects appear to be Premier Nikita Khrushchev's proposals of a date for the conference, within two months, place, Prague or Warsaw, and participants, 31 countries, including all of Germany's Second War enemies.

More important is the implicit eagerness of the Kremlin to get together with the West for talks. This is underscored by the U.S. tour of Russian Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan, who presents a friendly face and has been acting for all the world like a politician running for office.

Although talkative on a variety of topics, Mikoyan has been canny and cryptic in what he's said about the West Berlin and German questions. It's generally thought that his presence in the U.S. at this time—and his sumo demeanor—are calculated to have a tranquillizing effect and remove from American minds, if possible, the booby of ruthless Russian imperialism.

Khrushchev started his current campaign by demanding Nov. 27 that West Berlin be made a "free city," and announcing that Russian troops would be withdrawn within six months—by May 27. This was taken as an unacceptable ultimatum for the Western occupying countries to remove their troops as well.

Khrushchev's new communications are broader in scope and more moderate in tone, and are interpreted as an opportunity for Western counter-proposals that could result in a full-blown conference not only on Berlin and Germany but European security in general.

There was no official hint of what such counter-proposals might contain, but a possible clue was given last month by Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd in addressing the British House of Commons.

Lloyd's plan first of all recognized the Western basic position
