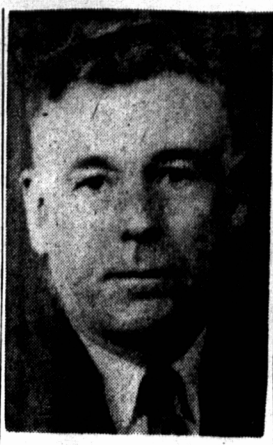

WILL JUDGE

Mr. H.L. MacLaren, of the Seed Certification Branch, Charlottetown will judge potatoes at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto this year. Mr. MacLaren has for the past number of years been in demand as a judge of potatoes at the Amherst Winter Fair and his invitation to preside at what has been termed "The Show of Champions" is an honour both to him and this Province.
 Judges at the "Royal" will come from all parts of the world. Among those who will travel the greatest distance will be the Earl of Dalhousie from Roxburghshire, Scotland; Mr. Duncan M. Stewart, Scotland; and Mr. Gwilym Evans, Wales. The Earl of Dalhousie will judge hunters in the horse show; Mr. Stewart will judge shorthorns and Mr. Evans, forage seed crops.

Action And Co-operation Needed, Says Mr. Shaw

Mr. W.R. Shaw returned Saturday from an extended trip through the New England States, Ottawa and various points in Ontario. During his trip he combined business with social contacts, but paid special attention to the potato situation. While in the Canadian capital, Ontario he conferred with federal and provincial authorities and officers of the Canadian Horticultural Council, on whose Board he is past President and Chairman of the Potato Committee.
 Mr. Shaw is not particularly optimistic regarding potato markets during the present season. He feels, indeed, that potato producers are facing one of the most serious conditions in their history. "Production in the United States has lowered from early predictions, and I feel our estimates in this Province as well as in Ontario are somewhat exaggerated," he stated.
 "Diversification policies south of the border for starch, animal feeds, flour and other purposes, as well as an over-all change in grade sizes, will remove substantial quantities from ordinary commercial channels throughout the season. Diversification practices, however, are mainly voluntary and under any conditions with all these factors working in full scope, there will still be a large surplus of potatoes available, and particularly in Maine, right on our doorstep."
 Some remedial influences may be made available, Mr. Shaw stated; but he would not enlarge at the present time on this statement.
 Queried regarding the report of the Canadian Tariff Board, he stated that this report was completed and likely to be released any day now. He pointed out, however, that the report would be a statement of fact as gathered from presentations placed before the Board and would not likely deal with recommendations. The report will be studied by the Government, which will then decide on the action to be taken. This action will not be likely to operate in time to render assistance to this year's marketing situation.
 With prevailing farm prices this fall on potatoes, turnips, hogs and some other commodities, and with farm costs exceptionally high and under continuous advance, Mr. Shaw feels that the farmers of this Province are facing a rather discouraging prospect. "Unfortunately," he stated, "the outlook for 1956, according to our best economists and observers, does not tend to promote confidence in our future agricultural economic stability. It is indeed a time, on the part of all, for unprejudiced, serious thinking and action, and the rendering of the fullest co-operation and material assistance for our farm producers."
