The schooner "Bride," which sailed from Picton for Tracadie, N. B., on the 19th of November, has turned up on Sable Island. The crew were brought to Halifax by the Government steamer "Newfield," on Wednesday. They suffered much from cold and hunger.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Dec. 14, 1880.

The Cabinet was in session three hours and a half yesterday afternoon. The council met shortly after three o'clock, all the Ministers being present. Mr. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, was in consultation with Mr. Gladstone for half an hour after the council separated. A news agency is the authority for the assertion that the Irish magistrates, in replying to Mr. Forster's circular, had expressed the opinion that they would be unable to carry out the provisions of the circular. Mr. Forster therefore, told his colleagues that the ordinary law could not be depended upon. It was proposed in the Cabinet council that the Irish Executive be given coercive powers with a view to indemnity from Parliament.

A despatch from Dublin to the "Times" says:—"It is hardly correct to say that anarchy prevails in Ireland, for there is a very distinct and potent government which is rapidly superseding the imperial government and is obtaining the ascendancy. It rules with an iron hand and promptitude which enforces instant obedience. Its code is clear, its executive resolute, its machinery complete and action uniform. There is a government de facto and a government de jure, the former wielding a power which is felt and feared, the latter exhibiting only pomp, but little reality of power. The former is a terror to well-doers, and the latter no terror to evil-doers. The law of the Land League is becoming the law of the land; and while the law of the State is costly, and to a large extent suspended, the new law is effectively administered cheaply and conveniently. League Courts are springing up in various places, and the people are instructed to have their disputes decided by such courts and to go no more to the sessions. The local magistrates in the west of Ireland have lately been surprised to find that no cases are brought before them except by the police.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

Halifax, Dec. 15.—Sailed, sch Ann Eliza, from P. E. Island, for Provincetown, Mass.

Boston, Dec. 11.—Ar. L. P. Churchill, from Charlottetown; W. H. Hatfield, from Georgetown.

(From the K. C. Advertiser.)

The S. S. Prince Edward sailed on Tuesday last, with the following exports, viz: 1122 cases canned goods, shipped by John Hughes, Charlottetown; 645 cases preserved lobsters, by Hon. S. Prowse, Murray Harbor; 221 cases preserved meats, by Longworth & Co., Ch'town; and 958 sacks starch, by St. Peter's Bay Starch Company.

The brig, Plymouth will sail in a day or two for Queensdown for orders, with 17,000 bush. oats. The brig, Canadian arrived from Bermuda on the 6th inst., received the greater part of a general cargo here, and proceeded on Tuesday to finish; thence to Newfoundland. Schr. Centennial, with a cargo of 5,500 bushels potatoes, will sail from Cardigan wharf to-day for Boston. The sch. Vegeta sailed from the same wharf on the 7th with 1,200 bushels potatoes for Halifax, all of which has been shipped by Messrs. A. A. Macdonald & Bros.

The Royal Arch, belonging to Capt. Aylward, Southport, sailed to-day for Newfoundland with produce.

The schrs. Laodamia and Mary M., from Newfoundland, with herring; Sea Gull, from Halifax, with merchandize; W. Rogers, from Lingan, with coal; and the Mary Jane, with limestone, are all discharging at the Railway Wharf. The Minnie E., Anderson, master, is also discharging herring, and will lay up for the winter.

The brig, Sireus, with 5,500 bushels potatoes, and the schooner Pocahontas, with 1609, the former for Boston and the latter for Halifax, both owned by the Hon. D. Gordon, are almost ready to sail. A cargo of oats and pork are being shipped in the Mary Frances, by B. Rogers & Co., for Newfoundland.

The sch. Cora, chartered by R. Munro, Esq., for Halifax, completed a cargo of 1100 bushels potatoes and 1600 bushels oats, on Tuesday.

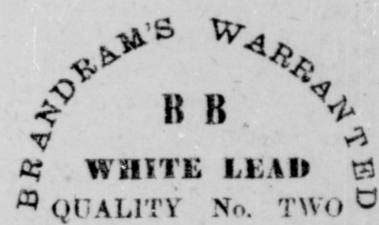
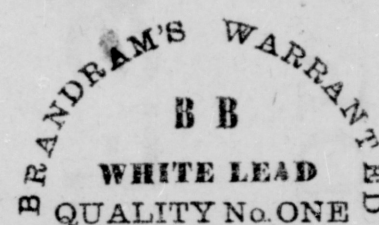
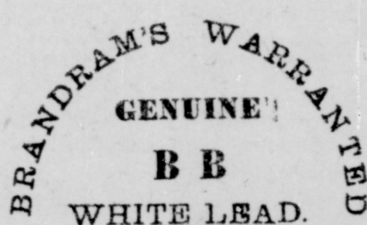
