STOMACH OF IRISHMAN HAS RARE COLLECTION

LONDON (AP)—Two doctors report that 141 objects including 126 pieces of bone from an Irishman's stomach.
"The patient," says their report, "has been removed from the British medical journal, 'had an uneventful recovery.'"

The Irishman, who was 37, was admitted to the surgical unit of Fitzroy's Hospital in Cork on Nov. 30, 1961.
"An x-ray of the abdomen revealed the presence of a large mass of metallic objects, apparently in the pelvis," says the doctors.

Seed Potato Experts In Nfld. To Assist In Nematode Battle

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Five potato seed experts from the federal agriculture department are in Newfoundland to help local agriculture officials in the battle against the golden nematode, a potato burrowing insect discovered in the Conception Bay area last fall.
The specialists and fieldmen from the agriculture department here are now in various parts of the province collecting soil samples for testing in a microscopic examination early next year.

Last fall about 2,000 samples were taken from various parts of Newfoundland. G. C. Morgan, district supervisor with the federal agriculture department, said these were taken at random.
"Right now we are making a systematic collection of soil samples from every place of cultivated ground."
The pest last fall turned up in the soil in the Bonne Bay and Botwood areas, on the Burin Peninsula, Trinity and Conception Bay, and on the southern shore of the Avalon Peninsula.

Canadian Auto Parts Mission Finds Tough Market In Europe

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian auto parts manufacturers seeking markets in the European auto industry face some tough, but not impossible—hurdles.
For those that succeed, the market could be a big one.
That's the picture set in a report by an 11-man auto parts trade mission, sponsored by the trade department, which visited the French, German and British auto industries last June.
The report said the European industry, which makes some 6,500,000 cars a year, buys more of its parts in its home market.
But stiff competition in Europe, plus a growing consciousness of the need to increase foreign trade, has convinced many companies to examine any available market.

South led the ace of clubs. American audience groaned heavily as dummy won the trick with the King. South cashed two more times and two clubs and an ace. At last, that's what the audience thought.
Declarer played the ace and another heart, going up with a trick when East showed out and signaled with the eight of clubs. South was now said to be in the lack of hearts because of the danger that West might have started with two clubs. He was.
West led the ace of clubs. South took the ace and returned a low club, won the trick. If East had now led a diamond, South would have gone down. South West could then make two trump tricks regardless of which card South chose to ruff with.
But East returned the ace of clubs and South made four hearts.

Pearson Plans Speech At UN

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson will address the United Nations next Thursday at the opening of the 18th General Assembly, his office has announced.
He had been expected to speak to the UN next Friday but following a telephone conference Friday with President Kennedy, Mr. Pearson made arrangements to speak a day earlier.
Mr. Kennedy will fly to New York Monday night, returning to Ottawa Sunday afternoon, Sept. 22.
Mr. Pearson is expected to speak to the assembly about 10:30 a.m. Thursday as the second speaker following Brazil.

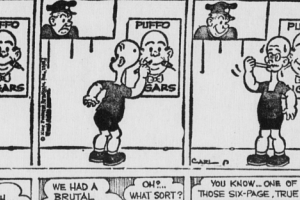
