The Liberal - Conservative Party Strong, Determined and United.

Confident of Victory.

A convention of Liberal-Conservative delegates for the second Legislative Council District of Queen's County was held in McLeod's Hall, Charlottetown, this forenoon. The attendance was large, representative and respectable. Among the gentlemen present were Colin M. Hon. Neil McLeod, Premier, was then asked to address the meeting, and did so in a short and pointed speech. He expressed the pleasure he felt on seeing so large and so representative a meeting of the Legislative Council electors of the district; and said that he hoped and trusted that the choice of candidates to be made would be judicious. It is important, he said, that the Liberal-Conservative should be strengthened in the Upper House. As an illustration of this he related an account of the difficulty experienced by the Government in securing the passage of the bill by which the mortgage vote was abolished. That bill hung fire for weeks, until the very last day of the session. He had been threatened that if the mortgage vote were not restored, the bill—a very important measure—would be rejected by the Council. The Government refused to be moved by the threats, and the Council were, at last, on the very last day of the session, compelled to accept the bill without the mortgage vote, rather than take the responsibility of throwing it overboard. By this one fact would be seen the great importance of strengthening the Government party in the Legislative Council. The returning councillor (Hon. James Nicholson) is undoubtedly a strong man. He was strong when elected. He is very much stronger now. He has filled his position to the satisfaction of the Government and the country. As to the reduction of the legislature, he believed that the interests of all classes of the community would be amply protected if there were only one House, while the expenses of legislation would be reduced. Perhaps the electors will, at some time, agree with the Government in respect to this question. At any rate, he would leave the convention fully assured that the delegates present would make a judicious selection of candidates to carry the banner of the Liberal-Conservative party on to victory. Victory would, he felt certain, be theirs if they only worked and worked heartily for the candidates of their choice. Premier McLeod was applauded as he left the room.

Hon. James Nicholson came forward and thanked the electors for the support they had given in when he was elected, and expressed his hope that the candidates now to be selected by the Convention would be equally successful as a result of their efforts. He spoke highly of his colleague, Mr.

Martin, and stated that he would heartily support the candidates chosen by the convention, whoever they might be.

Dr. Beers, of Cherry Valley, then made a few well-chosen remarks, and moved that the Hon. James Nicholson be nominated to contest the election on behalf of the Liberal-Conservative party.

EDWARD GRANT, Esq., seconded the motion.

WILLIAM J. LOGAN, Esq., moved that James Ross, Esq., be one of the Liberal-Conservative candidates, expressing at the same time his opinion that the north end of the district should have its representative, and that for this purpose it would be hard to find a better man than Mr. Ross.

WALTER GRANT, Esq., endorsed this opinion, and seconded the motion, saying that as the north end of the district had handsomely supported the candidate resident in the southern end, so the south would rally to the support of the candidate from the north.

DUNCAN CRAWFORD, Esq., said that he had great pleasure in supporting the nomination of Mr. Ross, and that he felt sure that Mr. Ross would be heartily supported by Liberal-Conservatives at the south end of the district.

WILLIAM SHAW, Esq., said that Mr. Ross was widely known as a man of intelligence and business capacity, and that the Liberal-Conservatives would do well to select him as the colleague of the Hon. James Nicholson, and give both gentlemen a hearty and undivided support.

Both motions were then put separately to the Convention, and carried unanimously.

HON. DONALD FERGUSON was then asked to address the Convention. In reply he delivered a short, vigorous speech. He said that although the district is a close one he felt sure that the candidates just chosen would be elected if only they received the hearty and unanimous support of the Liberal-Conservatives of the District. He referred to Hon. James Nicholson's long experience and excellent service in both branches of the Legislature, and to the ability, tact, moderation and good judgment which characterized his conduct as Leader of the Government in the Upper House. He spoke of Mr. Ross as an able and honest man, a man who commands the respect and confidence of those who know him, a man who will get votes never before polled for a Liberal-Conservative candidate. He also expressed forcibly his sense of the obligations under which the party and the country are to Alexander Martin, Esq., and of the manly, straightforward action which Mr. Martin had taken in respect to the public questions of the day, and to the recent contest in which he was by a few votes defeated. The policy of the Government is now, as ever, he said, to keep down the expenditure to the lowest point consistent with the efficiency of the public service, to collect the debts due the Province by the Federal Government. After elaborating several points in this policy, Mr. Ferguson referred briefly to the campaign of slander, misrepresentation and injustice which his opponents had carried on against him, pointing out that it could not possibly be successful in the end, and shewing cause for his belief that the political chickens which his opponents have hatched, will, ere long, come home to roost.

HON. MR. NICHOLSON then accepted the responsibility which the Convention had thrown upon him, thanked the delegates for their expression of confidence and good will, and asked all present to do their best to secure a victory on the 30th July.

MR. ROSS was engaged in the Grand Jury Room and was therefore unable to be present.

On motion of John J. McQuaid, Esq., seconded by Roderick McDonald, Esq., the thanks of the Convention were unanimously accorded to Alexander Martin, Esq., for his services in the Legislature.

MR. MARTIN thanked the Convention for this expression of their appreciation of his services and fully endorsed the proceedings of the Convention. The candidates chosen are, he said, good men and will both have his hearty support. He declared that he felt confident that the Liberal-Conservative Party would rally to the support of

Analyst Best Explains.

To the Editor of the Globe:

SIR,—In fairness to myself, I must notice certain paragraphs published in the telegraphic report of the McLeod case, at Picton. The whole difficulty arose from the fact that my "notes" of work done in the laboratory were not the "original notes." I was so unfortunate as to have made a fresh copy of the rough "original notes" not being aware of the emphasis that would be laid upon this point in a court of law. I had the misfortune to find the greater part of my evidence shut out, because I could not produce the "original notes." In addition to this, a number of questions were asked in the cross-examination which only a medical expert could answer, not being chemical questions at all. It will not be difficult for any one to understand the difficulty that a chemist would experience in answering questions of detail without being allowed to refer to notes.

N. B. and P. E. Island Conference.

(Special Correspondence of The Examiner.)

FREDERICTON, June 20.

The afternoon session was occupied almost altogether with the consideration of the Supernumerary Fund. In 1889 it paid 90 per cent. of its claims; but this year, on account of the great number of claimants, it is not expected to pay more than 80 per cent. This will cause great privation among many of the supernumerary ministers, whose sole support is derived from this source. Several resolutions were passed by a ministerial vote, recommending to the general committee changes in the constitution of the fund. Some of these changes are merely verbal, while others are important. The annual payments from ministers is to be raised from \$10 to \$12. It was thought that ministers having a regular income could more easily afford the extra two dollars per year than the supernumerary ministers could afford to be deprived of 10 or 20 per cent. of their incomes. Then the General Conference was recommended to make it obligatory on each annual Conference to raise an average of at least 10c. per member. The mode of assessment was to be left to the discretion of the Conferences concerned. Further, it was decided that one-sixth of the annual subscriptions of ministers be added to the capital stock. Then Conference recommended that the present securities of the fund be valued by a competent committee. By an almost unanimous vote it was recommended to general committee to appoint a general agent of the fund.

The discussions relative to the above matters were participated in by Revs. C. H. Paisley, A. M. F. Marshall, Dr. Stewart, J. F. Estey, G. Steel, J. A. Clarke, A. M. J. C. Irvine, J. Read, C. Evans and others.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SERVICE.

A very interesting meeting was held, largely attended. Rev. H. Daniel made a good chairman. Rev. W. J. Kirby read the report. Addresses were delivered by J. E. Irvine, Esq., St. John, and Revs. Levi S. Johnson and Edwin C. Turner. The meeting throughout was most profitable. It was better attended than any of the public meetings up to date.

More Damage by Lightning.

Moncton advices report that Andrew Little and wife, of Mechanics Settlement, about six miles from Egin Corner, lost their lives by the storm of lightning on Wednesday evening last. Mr. Little was sick in bed, and his father, George Little, had called to see him about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Two hours later the house was struck by lightning and in a moment was in flames. Neighbors arrived at the scene as quickly as possible, and were horrified at the sight they witnessed through the window. Mr. Little and his wife (the latter could be seen lying upon the floor) had apparently been paralyzed by the shock and were unable to make any effort to save themselves, while the fire was in such an advanced stage that the neighbors were unable to do anything whatever towards rescuing them. The building was quickly reduced to ashes, and the charred remains of Little and his wife were found among the debris.
