

Schurman Tender Accepted For Community Auditorium; High School Is Approved

A new community auditorium and a new high school were approved last night when the Summer Street Town Council accepted the M. F. Schurman Company, Limited tender of \$231,650 for the construction of a community auditorium and also gave approval for an expenditure by the School Board of \$231,650 for acceptance of the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. tender for the erection of a new High School.

The Council was unanimous in its decision to have the two new buildings constructed on the recently acquired Brennan property and the auditorium will face Beaver Street while the High School will be fronting on Summer Street in accordance with plans and specifications previously agreed on. Letters were read from a committee of the Board of Trade and from the Board of School Trustees requesting reconsideration by the Council of its decision regarding the location of the two proposed buildings, and suggesting the area north of the High School on the east side of Summer Street as a more suitable location. However, after lengthy discussion by the councillors it was agreed that for several reasons it was advisable to follow the original plans prepared by the architect and place both new buildings on the Brennan property.

Councillor Jenkins pointed out the extra cost in making changes at this late date and said that the financial situation was very important. Councillor Clark said the delay in getting started had been due to the Brennan property. He recalled that the opinion of a number of citizens and representatives of organizations had been sought during initial preparations of the plans for the new buildings and that at that time no objections had been voiced by anyone regarding the location and he felt that time would prove that the Council's decisions had been well made.

Councillor MacDougall agreed with Councillors Clark and Jenkins and added that while the Board of Trade committee made a suggestion regarding the Brennan property as a park area, this property had been acquired as a site for the construction of the new buildings and he believed that the majority of the people were in accord with this intention. Councillor Lidstone referred to the fact that existing parks had already cost considerable money and that to tear apart the present well planned arrangements at Queen Elizabeth Park would be throwing money away. He referred also to adequate parking facilities that were being provided for in the proposed construction.

Councillor Steele, in discussing a point made by the Board of Trade committee letter regarding the traffic danger faced by children in crossing the street to the auditorium, said that the children from the west part of town cross

F. Schurman Co., Ltd.

Mayor Wedge said that the suggestion would be considered, and hoped it would not be too long before some announcement could be made concerning this property. It was agreed by Council that the matter be left for discussion by the Council in committee following the adjournment of the regular Council meeting last night.

A letter was read from Chief of Police Peter R. White stating that since the rate of Blue Cross payments was to be increased the members of the force were asking for permission to change to group insurance.

After discussion by the Council it was decided that a committee of three should be appointed to meet with the finance committee of the existing Blue Cross and present a report to the Council at a later date.

In another resolution Dr. J. A. Dolron was appointed to the Board of School Trustees replacing Mr. J. Harold Arsenault.
