NOT A BRILLIANT OPERATION.

Two years have been occupied in straightening the line of railway at North Wiltshire—and it's not straight after all! Twenty-five thousand dollars of the people's money have been doled out among the Liberals of the vicinity; and yet, as we happen to know, the Liberals of the vicinity are not all satisfied with the object-lesson they have had of the methods and practice of their Liberal Government. After all the work and expense, the railway is only a little more than half a mile shorter than it was from the very beginning. There will be no perceptible lowering of the rates for passengers and freight on account of it. The country will, practically, save nothing by it,—except perhaps a small amount per year as reduction of the cost of snow-fighting. One significant and important fact has been demonstrated: there was cause for the curve. The long embankment in the new line is at one point fifty two feet high, and the cuttings at other points are (so we are informed) eighteen or twenty feet deep. So that the new work has vindicated the old Conservative Government which allowed the curve to be made, and has shown that the straightening of other curves will bring neither credit to the Liberals nor profit to the country. If the money (\$25,000,000) thrown away at North Wiltshire had been expended in the construction of one of the short lines projected by the Conservatives, or in the extension of the line further into Charlottetown, or in the erection of a new station house at the foot of Great George street, or in any other way that could have benefited the country the Liberals would have won some credit. As it is the expenditure is in the same category as that of the \$20,000 expended on the Petrel.

WHERE SYMPATHY IS DUE.

The press exponents of the Farquharson administration count up the Premier's majority (on paper), argue that the position of the Opposition is hopeless, and bespeak the sympathy of the public for THE EXAMINER and the Conservative party. Now, we incline to the opinion that the boot is on the other leg. With an anticipated deficit of \$15,000, with the new Prince of Wales College to pay for and the Asylum tangle to unravel in some way with dissatisfaction (bordering on mutiny) in the party, with the country alive to the deceit and rascality practiced by the party leaders—as witness the result of the election in New London—with our teachers smarting under a sense of the high-handed injustice that has been administered to them, with the Education Department all wrong and the Public Works Department doing next to nothing for the benefit of the people,—we think that Premier Farquharson and those of his colleagues who enjoy his confidence are the persons who need sympathy. Yet there is little sympathy due them. They accepted the situation, and must needs lie upon the bed (not a bed of roses!) which they have made for themselves. As for the Liberal Conservative Party they have nothing to gain (either individually or collectively) by taking the Government, under the circumstances existing; and we feel sure that they will not attempt to do so until called to the duty by the clear voice of the people.

—The Klondike Midnight Sun chronicles the arrival at Dawson of a steamer with sixty tons of whiskey aboard. The Montreal Gazette remarks that our plebiscite Laurier Government seems to have found out what Dawson wanted, and fixed things so that the want was provided for.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—We are to have the East Prince election on the 14th of December or about three weeks from date. So the people of East Prince must act (if they're going to act) quickly. Nomination on the 7th.

—The latest trade returns show a decrease of exports, in the past four months as compared with the same months of last year, of \$2,707,974 and an increase of the duty collected on imports amounting to \$1,883,960. Prudent and economical men of business must conclude that the tendency of trade in Canada is not in the right direction. The people are paying more taxes, buying more goods, and not selling as much as they sold last year.

—Hamilton is to be congratulated for having been, among Canadian cities, the first to obtain electric power by utilizing the old Welland Canal, at Allanburg, and making the other necessary connections. The power-house was built near St. Catherine's. To effect these results, all the capital which the Cataract Power Company has found it necessary to date to call up is \$250,000. The Monetary Times states that Hamilton is naturally and justly elated over the achievement. The distance of transmission is thirty four miles, and it is claimed that the loss of current is only 8 per cent.

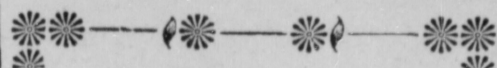

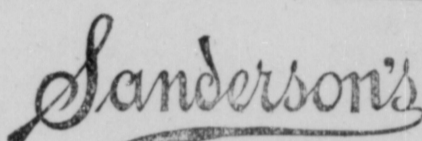
