Seismograph Crews Finish

The seismograph Service Corporation crews left Prince Edward Island yesterday after spending almost a year doing survey work in various parts of the Province for Imperial Oil Co. Ltd.

The crews have been given new assignments at Hillsborough, New Brunswick, about 12 miles south of Moncton.

Nine trucks and about 18 men are involved in the transfer which, at least for the present, completes the seismographic work the company has been conducting here.

While these surveys have been concentrated mostly in Prince Edward Island, work has been done all over the Island. About 1450 test holes have been dug to average depths of 60 feet to determine possible well site locations.

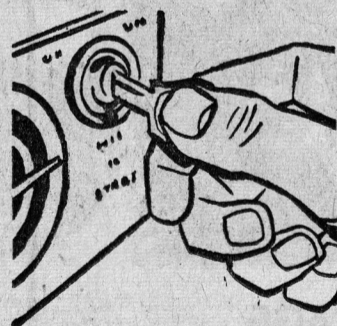
