### ENGLAND AND THE WAR.

#### Mr. Chamberlain Speaks on Continental Criticism.

LONDON, June 20.—Referring to continental criticism, Mr. Chamberlain, after remarking that England always expected this, went on to say: "But there are quarters whence even a note of disapproval would be a matter of serious concern. I refer to our colonies and to the United States. I think we are happy in that we have their good opinion and approval. "It is true this good opinion of the United States is not unmingled with other sentiments. I will not now enter upon the causes, partly political and partly sentimental, which have led certain Americans to sympathize with what they call a republic, although its whole existence and whole practice have been one perpetual denial of the principles upon which their great republic is founded. I believe the great majority of true Americans recognize that our aims in this war are as high and unselfish as those which animated themselves in the Spanish-American struggle. They fought then for justice and liberty, not for their own subjects indeed, but for those whom they believed to be the victims of oppression; and we did not enter into quizzical disquisitions or technical discussions, but recognized that they were carrying out, as Anglo-Saxons, a great work of civilization and humanity. Now we are making their sympathies, and we believe that in the long run we shall gain the final zeal of their approval."

#### Useless to Make Such Pledges.

TORONTO, June 20.—The Toronto Methodist Conference has refused to endorse the plan projected by the Dominion Alliance for obtaining pledges from one hundred thousand voters to support prohibition candidates, taking the ground that it was useless to make such pledges.

### TWO PREMIERS CONTRASTED.

Sir,—In order to show the difference between the statesman and the political trickster we have only to contrast the actions of two premiers of the provinces of this Dominion.

In Manitoba we see Hugh John Macdonald, although personally not in favor of prohibition as a principle nor yet being a teetotaler, bringing down a bill in accordance with the wishes of the people whom he represents. Wishing to meet the views of the advanced temperance sentiment of that Province Premier Macdonald got a man who was a prohibitionist on principle to draw up the bill, and his party having made prohibition a plank in their platform during the late election campaign he was willing to stake the life of his government on the success of that measure. He considered that nothing would be so base and mean as to have politicians get or repudiate the solemn declarations made during an election campaign. And, being a statesman, who, under the British constitution, is elected to carry out the wishes of the people and not his own personal opinions, he took the first opportunity to give the province what they asked for on more than one occasion, but which was denied the a by Greenway in spite of his promises and professions of advanced temperance opinion.

On the other hand, we see Premier Farquharson, who pretends to personally in favor of the principle of prohibition, and knowing that nine tenths of the people of this province are in favor of the most rigid laws in that direction, bringing down what he hypocritically calls the Prohibition Act of 1900,—an act that does not prohibit and that does not come into effect till the next century. Under its provisions all the clubs in Charlottetown are at perfect liberty to sell to their members all the liquor that they require. But Hugh John Macdonald was not depending for his election on nor ruled by the influences of a drinking club and he made the law apply to all clubs and other associations. With that feature of his bill the opposition in this province were fully in accord. They saw the government on every point, and, to use a gambler's expression, they went one letter. But Farquharson, fearing for the friendship of the Charlottetown Club, refused to accept the amendments of the opposition and voted them out.

In introducing his so-called Prohibition Bill,—by the way Hugh John calls his "The Liquor Act"—you would imagine that Premier Farquharson was prepared to "die in peace" because the Pineaau Government was permitted to live long enough to enable him to bring in what he considered to be the crowning act of his political life. He made the boast that he was going to stand by that great principle of his life, but not till after he assured the House that he asked all the Government members how they were going to vote and was assured of their support. But that assurance was given on the understanding that the clubs were to be allowed to deal out "doubled distilled damnation" till all hours of the night to such members on the Government side of the House as would require it. And the Premier sacrificed the avowed principle of his life to the whims of his followers.

That the prohibitionists of this province will be satisfied with a stone when they asked for bread is more than I can imagine, unless they are prepared to swallow their principles at the dictates of a political demagogue who thinks more of party and power than he does of those principles which he makes it his boast he is prepared to live up to.

Query—By the way, Mr. Editor, did it ever strike you as passing strange what strong advocates of temperance men become who have made sufficient to retire on out of the liquor business.
