New Federal Bldg. For Souris To Be Erected

OTTAWA (Special)—The Diefenbaker Government has decided to erect a new Federal building at Souris, with tenders likely to be called in early October, John A. MacDonald, Conservative MP for Kings, disclosed Monday.

The 1958-59 estimates provide a sum of \$70,000 for such a building. It would be used as a Post Office, and by the Federal fisheries and agricultural branches. The National Employment Service also may have an office in area to that of the first. Provision will be made for some expansion of government services.

Islanders Fear As Volcano Belches Anew

HORTA, Azores (AP)—New violent activity of the Capelinhos volcano off Fayal Island caused apprehension among Horta's population Monday.

The volcano formed a new island off Fayal coast nearly a year ago, forcing evacuation of hundreds of families. After sporadic activity the volcano is erupting violently again, belching blocks of basalt more than 1,000 feet into the air and pouring incandescent lava from its central crater.

Ashe have fallen on Pico Island, four miles away, and there are constant earthquakes. At night the entire island of Fayal is lit by the volcano's glare. Hundreds of Portuguese and foreign tourists are flocking to Fayal to see the spectacle. Crops which had been rescued after the first destructive phase of the eruptions are once more covered with ashes.

Sask. Senator Dies In Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—Senator Arthur Marcotte of Saskatchewan and Montreal died late Monday in hospital here. He was 85.

He was admitted to hospital Saturday. Cause of death was not immediately known. A native of Montreal, he was appointed to the Senate in 1931 as a Progressive Conservative representing Saskatchewan, where he had moved in the early 1900s. His addresses were Ponteix in Southwestern Saskatchewan and Outremont, Que.

WASHINGTON (Reuters)—The Queen and President Eisenhower exchanged messages Monday to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the completion of the first trans-Atlantic cable.

New Political Party To Enter Field In Quebec

MONTREAL (CP)—The Civic Action League Monday announced its decision to enter provincial politics as a third party. The league, headed by former Montreal mayor Jean Drapeau, until now operated only at the municipal level.

Announcement of the formation of the new party was made in a prepared statement by J. Z. Leon Patenaude, league secretary-treasurer. A meeting of 47 representatives from all parts of Quebec province, held in Montreal Monday under league auspices, decided to form "a new political movement, the object of which will be to give the province of Quebec a regime of social liberation, economic progress and cultural expansion."

The statement said the meeting "recognized the inability of the traditional political parties to offer a program equal to the needs" of the province.

During the intervening nine years, he said, he hopes plans to enhance the capital area's beauty will bring about "such vast changes" that by the 100th birthday of Confederation, the main objectives of the over-all scheme will have been fulfilled.

He spoke as the Commons studied and passed unanimously a government bill revising the federal agency charged with carrying out the plan.

Envisaged as extending over 30 years, the plan was formally started in 1926. It is aimed at unifying the whole Ottawa area, including neighboring Hull, Que., into a showpiece community. It includes building scenic parkways along the rivers that meet in the area—there are three: the Ottawa, the Rideau and the Gatineau—and north for several miles into the Gatineau hills of Quebec.

PM Predicts Vast Changes In Capital In Nine Years

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker Monday expressed hope that by 1967, centenary of Canadian nationhood, Ottawa and its environs will form "a capital city worthy of Canada's destiny."

Justice Minister Fulton said rioting prisoners caused \$52,500 property damage Sunday at Collins Bay penitentiary near Kingston, Ont.

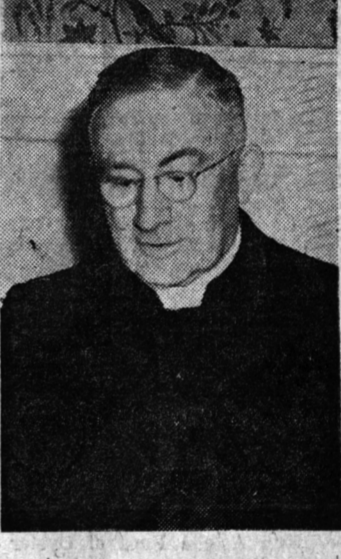
Prime Minister Diefenbaker undertook to make public "regulations" governing travel arrangements in the Arctic.

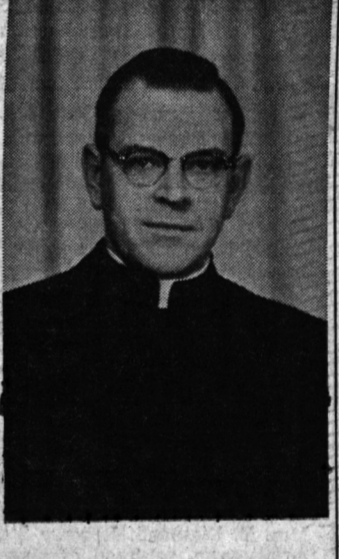

Contract Let For School At Camp

OTTAWA (CP)—Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation announced Monday a contract of \$419,078 has been let to Atlas Construction Company Limited, Fredericton, for construction of a new 18-room high school at Camp Gagetown.

The new school will be built for the defence department in Ormoco Village, adjacent to the camp.

India Gives Support To Arab Views

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—India, the leading neutralist power in Asia, made a significant defence of Arab nationalism at Monday's meeting of the United Nations emergency assembly on the Middle East.

The Indian support for the Arab position, expressed by delegate Arthur Lall, indicated that Western-backed proposals for the UN to take over in the Middle East might not win a vote in an assembly where the Arab-Islamic nations make up a powerful voting bloc.

Lall said, in one of the most important speeches of this emergency meeting, that the strongest criticism of Arab nationalism comes from "those part of the world whose life is squarely on a vigorous, flourishing and well-established nationalism."

He described Arab nationalism as a "powerful, dynamic force."

Suggests Montreal Mayor Be Called By House Committee

OTTAWA (CP)—Vancouver Conservative John Drysdale Monday suggested that Senator Sarto Fournier, mayor of Montreal, be called before the public accounts committee now investigating construction of the federal printing bureau in neighboring Hull, Que.

The Burnaby-Richmond member made the proposal after Frank McGee (PC—York-Scarborough) said a statement last week by Senator Fournier had described as lies evidence given by Maj.-Gen. H. A. Young, deputy public works minister.

Gen. Young told the committee last week that Senator Fournier had tried to exert pressure on him to grant to a Montreal firm a contract to move printing bureau equipment from Ottawa to Hull although an Ottawa company's tender was much lower.

Mr. MacEachern was supported by J. W. Pickersgill (Lib.—Bonaville-Tvillingate). Mr. Pickersgill said if Senator Fournier was aggrieved he could raise the matter in the Senate and if Gen. Young was aggrieved he could go to court.

Mr. Drysdale said he wanted to challenge Mr. MacEachern's ruling if the chairman persisted. Mr. MacEachern said his ruling stood.

"We have more important matters to deal with than to settle disputes with Mr. A and Mr. B," Mr. MacEachern said. "It is quite obvious they don't like each other."

Mr. Drysdale said he would challenge the ruling at the committee's next sitting. He made the statement just before the committee adjourned until today.
