MEASURES.—On and after the first of May, the wine gallon, heretofore in use, will be substituted by the Imperial gallon, according to the provisions of the Act passed by the Dominion Parliament in May, 1879. Therefore, any person who sells by any denomination of measure, other than the Dominion Measure (i. e., the Imperial) will be subject to a fine of twenty dollars. According to the Act, two Imperial gallons shall be a peck, eight Imperial gallons shall be one bushel, and twenty five gallons shall be one barrel. Five Imperial gallons are equal to six gallons wine measure. It will be well for dealers to post themselves on this matter. They can receive all necessary information from James Reddin, Esq., Inspector of Weights and Measures.

LINDLEY OPERA Co.—Last evening this organization produced a comedy drama, entitled "Miriam's Crime," which drew a fair house, that made up in appreciation for any deficiency in number. The plot is very simple but is the vehicle for exhibiting some fine character acting, notably in that peculiar genius, Biles. NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, April 27.
After recess the House went into Committee of Supply. After a good deal of uninteresting discussion which was confined to western members, estimates for Canals and North-West Indians, were passed.

Mr. Royal gave a shocking account of the North-West Police. They cost nearly \$1,000 each, but are poorly fed and clothed—seldom get any drill, don't wear uniforms, the forts they occupy are indefensible, and they buy and sell Indian girls as slaves and prostitutes.

Sir John did not believe these things were half so bad, but would see matters righted.

Just before adjournment Mr. McKenzie stated that he had yesterday determined to withdraw from the position of Leader of the Opposition, and did not intend to act hereafter except in his individual capacity as a member on that side of the House.

Sir John expressed the hope that the gentleman who would succeed to the leadership would display the zeal, faithfulness and ability that Mr. McKenzie had done.

The House adjourned at two o'clock. Messrs. Snowball and Muirhead left for home to-day.

Mr. Mackenzie's resignation is the universal topic this morning. A caucus is called for to-morrow.

LONDON, April 27.
The Standard says that Beaconsfield took leave of the Queen yesterday.

The report that Lord Derby was offered a seat in the Cabinet is untrue.

The Daily Telegraph says that before the commencement of Parliament, Lord Beaconsfield will address a meeting of Conservatives, comprising members of both Houses, probably May 19th.

The Times, on the foreign relations of England and the new Government, says:—"We have reason to believe that Austria has, through her ambassador here, been reassured as to the demeanor of the new administration."

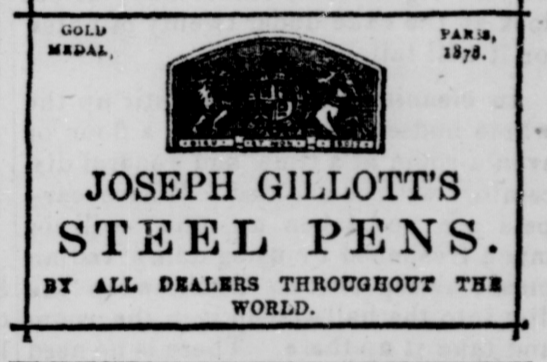
