There were only three American professionals in the Maritime Open golf championships at Belvedere over the weekend, but only three were good enough to walk off with \$2,200 each, \$5,950 in prize money.

The only Maritimers to break the U.S. domination were Canada's Gerald Nicholson and Kelly Burnard of Halifax's Ashburn course. Nicholson picked up \$300 for a third place tie with Jim Veno of Waterfield, Maine, and Burnard finished 5th for \$100.

A good driver golfer and a terrific putter, Ron LeClair, instructing pro at Waterfield, Maine, took top money of \$1,200 and second place, seven strokes back, was Dick Dixon, Hudson, New Hampshire, who collected \$600.

This is only the fourth of 61 rounds have sponsored the Maritime Open but if this weekend's play is a preview of what is to come, American domination is what will get.

Canadian Junior Ch'ships

THE BIGGEST event on the Island's golf program for this season will be the Canadian Junior championships, scheduled for Belvedere, Sept. 1-4.

Open age championships are open to male amateur golfers, with a handicap of 12 or less, who have not reached their 19th birthday by midnight, Sept. 4, 1964. The field will consist of 100 to 125 players and if more than 80 register, those with the lowest handicaps will be accepted.

A 36-hole qualification round will be played Sept. 1, with the 35 qualifiers competing in match play for the championship Sept. 2. Quarter-finals and semi-finals will be played Sept. 3 and the final 16 on Sept. 4.

The Junior qualifying round Sept. 1 will include the Canadian Junior Team championships. Fourteen teams, representing each provincial golf association, will play six holes for the Pepsi-Cola trophy.

Entry details can be received from any of the three Island clubs. The entry deadline is Aug. 21.
