

# North Vietnamese Troops Improve During Past Year

North Vietnamese troops have been engaging American units in the central highlands of South Viet Nam for more than a year. Associated Press photographer Horst Faa spent a week with U.S. troops searching

for the enemy. Here is his report on enemy units.

**PLUM DIERING, South Viet Nam (AP)** — North Vietnamese troops fighting in the jungles along the Cambodian border are better fed and healthier than they were a year ago. No starving or malaria-ridden prisoners are being taken. Senior U.S. officers believe the North Vietnamese have beaten the huge supply problem that plagued them last year at least for the time being.

Prisoners taken in operation Paul Revere IV in recent days have told interrogators: "We get rice and medicine. We would like more, but we get along."

Only 14 North Vietnamese prisoners have been taken by the 2nd Brigade, 4th U.S. Infantry Division, in recent weeks. The Americans have killed

## University Report Author Runs Into Sharp Criticism

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Dr. Robert O. Berdahl, co-author of the Duff-Berdahl report on university government in Canada, ran into his severest critics at a University of Western Ontario seminar here.

Howard Adelman, philosophy lecturer at Toronto's York University, said the report "missed the point" of problems facing Canadian universities.

The report, published last spring, advocated sweeping reforms in university government. Mr. Adelman said the report dealt only with the how of university government, not the why and wherefore.

The accusation triggered a pointed debate at a panel discussion at the student-sponsored three-day seminar.

Mr. Adelman suggested that universities are turning into sausage factories, providing students with a bachelor of arts degree and selling them to a commercial society. He claimed the report does not attempt to rectify this.

He argued that university government is bound up by committee work on basically meaningless issues.

Mr. Adelman criticised the report's stand that university governments should be comprised of boards of governors and academic policy-making senates. He said universities should have one governing body of students, faculty and administration so that everyone would know where responsibility lies.

Dr. Berdahl replied that he did not think the commercial society was as vast a "monolithic, unmitigated evil" as was implied by Mr. Adelman.

Dr. Berdahl said the purpose of the Duff-Berdahl report was to outline ways to create an open university community with a responsible decision-making process. He said the "why" of university government was a vast topic which could not be dealt with in the report.

The bidding:  
 West North East South

Opening lead—king of spades. Let's say you're declarer at four hearts and West cashes the K-A of spades. East plays high-low to show a doubleton. When West continues with a spade, you ruff high in dummy as East discards a low diamond.

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
