An accident about 3:30 yesterday afternoon at Valleyfield sent five persons to the Kings County Hospital.

The accident occurred when a late model Meteor driven by Gordon Buchanan, R.C.A.F., Labrador, left the road while rounding a turn and after travelling some distance in the ditch, crashed head-on into a tree. The force of the impact uprooted the large tree which was directly across the road from the United Church manse. The car was completely wrecked.

In hospital besides Mr. Buchanan are his three brothers-in-law, Willard, Sterling and John MacLeod, and 15-year-old Jamie MacLeod, some of whom are thought to be seriously injured.

The MacLeods are all from Upper Montague. The home address of the MacLeod boy was not learned. Mr. Buchanan is formerly from Heatherdale.

Rev. F. MacKinnon, who was in the hall of his home at the time of the accident and witnessed the crash, immediately phoned for medical assistance and the aid of the R.C.M.P. He was assisted by his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Vanburskirk, Mr. Allie Murray, Mr. Glen Miller and two painters working at the church in helping the accident victims.

Mr. Buchanan was thrown from the car on impact but a crow bar was necessary in removing Mr. Sterling MacDonald who was pinned in the front seat.

The injured men were given emergency treatment by Dr. Preston MacIntyre at the scene. They were then immediately removed to hospital.

It was reported John MacDonald has a broken hip; Willard MacDonald has a broken jaw and injured shoulder; Gordon Buchanan was said to have been most seriously injured, although the extent was not learned. Extent of injuries to Sterling MacDonald and to MacLeod was not learned.

6 Months And \$500 Fine In Excise Case

At Magistrates court in Georgetown on Wednesday afternoon, before Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. A Murray Harbor resident was fined \$5.00 for not having an operator's licence.

A resident of Cardigan charged with assault, had the charge against him dismissed.

Car Registered In Okinawa Attracts Much Attention

PERHAPS the most unique automobile registration ever to appear on island roads is the one shown above. The plate indicates that the vehicle was registered this year in the far eastern Island of Okinawa. Owner of the car, Major E.D. Bowman, U.S. Army (ret.) is shown at right.

Among the thousands of visitors now vacationing in this Province, it is likely that none have seen further than Major and Mrs. E.D. Bowman.

Until July 11, the retired U.S. Army officer and his wife, a U.S. Army nurse, were living in Okinawa, largest of the volcanic Riu-kiu or Loo-Choo group of islands located between Japan and the Chinese Nationalist stronghold of Formosa.

On both Okinawa and its neighbor island, Iwo Jima, epic battles were fought by the American forces in World War Two.

At Okinawa, Mrs. Bowman, who was the former Janet Sutherland of Montague, P.E.I. was on the nursing staff of the huge \$3,000,000 hospital.

Major and Mrs. Bowman arrived in Montague where they are the guests of Mrs. Minnikin's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Campbell.

Red Scientist Sees Spirit Of Unity At Pugwash Talks

OTTAWA (CP)—Soviet academician Alexander Vinogradov, who last April was one of four Soviet scientists attending the second Pugwash Conference, says a "spirit of common aims" reigned almost throughout the entire three weeks.

The Soviet geochemist's reactions to the conference, held at Lac Beauport, Que., and attended by scientists from eight countries on both sides of the Iron Curtain, were published Wednesday by the Soviet Embassy here in the publication, "U.S.S.R. Illustrated News."

The Pugwash conferences are convened and supported by Canadian-born U.S. financier Cyrus Eaton of Cleveland, Ohio. Scientists this year attended from the U.S.S.R., Red China, West Germany, the United Kingdom, the United States, France, Australia and Canada.

Dr. Vinogradov, besides belonging to the Soviet Academy of Sciences, heads Moscow University's geochemistry department, directs the Vernadsky Institute of Geochemistry and Analytical Chemistry, and specializes in the chemistry of the earth's crust.

"I liked the Canadian roads with their excellent traffic service," he writes in the article, "and the parks of the Canadian cities."

"The goodwill and hospitality of the Canadians are unforgettable."

He said the conference's success "was facilitated by the friendly atmosphere and the spirit of common aims which reigned almost throughout the entire three weeks' stay of the scientists from various countries in hospitable Lac Beauport."

This year's conference dealt with means of reducing international tension and of removing the threat of sudden outbreak of nuclear warfare.

Dr. Vinogradov appealed for greater exchanges among Canadian and Soviet scientists in physics, chemistry and geology.
