END OF THE WAR.

It is announced that Lord Roberts will leave South Africa on the 29th inst. Evidently the commander-in-chief regards the South African war as practically ended. He will, of course, leave a large force in the Transvaal; and bodies of troops will, necessarily, for some time to come, be maintained at other points in South Africa. According to the latest reports the British lost in the war 387 officers and 3,590 non-commissioned officers and men killed or died from wounds. These numbers are much smaller than have been lost by Great Britain in many a single battle. But to them must be added 160 officers and 5,950 men died of enteric fever and other diseases. The expense, in money, has been enormous; but it will probably, in large part, be eventually recouped by the people of the country on whose behalf the war was carried on. The Transvaal Government stood in the path of Civil Liberty and Progress, and induced the government of the Orange Free State to join it in an invasion of British colonies in South Africa. The result is that the territory comprised in the Transvaal and the Orange Free State has been added to the British Empire.

Since Lord Roberts took command of the troops in South Africa, the Boer forces have been for the most part fugitive. They managed to keep the field only by running away when the British forces came in touch with them, occasionally and incidentally capturing a small British convoy or outpost. Among their kojies and natural fastnesses it was hard to run them down. But they have at last been killed, captured and dispersed until there is but a small and insignificant residuum of the well equipped army, which, less than a year ago, proudly challenged and defied the power of Great Britain.

BUYING VOTES.

SIR.—After pretending to be worshipping God in His sanctuary yesterday, no sooner were they out on the street than two prominent Brits were overheard by a lady to be talking about buying votes. "Oh!" says one, "can't you buy him anyhow?" "No," says the other, "I don't think I can!" Thus we see which way the wind blows—the man who "bought over" Pineau thinks he can follow his hand and pursue the trade with impunity. The electors have to be very cautious that smart and active scrutineers are appointed in each polling booth, and the voter should not lose sight of his ballot until it is deposited in his presence in the box. It is to be hoped that the people will realize that they are sovereign and that they are above the Government, and that they will spurn as the greatest insult that could be offered to them a bribe to enslave and enslave themselves into the bondage of a corrupt party. I have better hopes of them than to take the bribe; but if they do take the money which belongs to the people, let them vote against the briber every time. When shall we have pure government? Never so long as bribery, corruption and falsified returns are permitted. It is rather to be pitied that one of the parties was of the opinion the man could not be bought. The Pineau government is showing its hand early, and it is placing the voters of West Queen's at a very low estimate when it imagines the voters can be bought. One of the reforms which ought to be inaugurated is that no contracts should be given when an election is near at hand. The people must have a free hand and no undue influence should be used to thwart the rule of the people. It is not government, for, by and through the people the grubs want—it is Government by bribery, stealing balls and such things as office and promise will give. The overheard conversation on the street on the Lord's Day is an evidence of the means that are to be used, and I hereby caution the Christian people in this I have to be watchful and see if there ever was a purer election, that this be done, and let the briber in the ways that are dark and the tricks that are vain be brought to just account.

ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED.—The Monks of the Abbey at South Tilley, Victoria County, N. B., last Wednesday night Mrs. William Ernt drowned herself in a head of water that stood near the house. She had been in failing health for some time, and despondency consequent upon this is ascribed as the cause of the fatal act. Early in the morning she got up while her husband was still sleeping. When he awoke and missed her, he searched for her at once, and found her body was fastened to the head of the bed, whether he had thrown herself.

SOLDIERS OF THE QUEEN.—The Boston Stock Company presenting manager Bewley's Boer-British war drama, "Soldiers of the Queen" left this morning for the mainland, crossing by the Princess. The performance on Saturday night was attended by a fairly large audience in spite of the heavy rain, and the presentation was superior to that of the previous evening. Mr. Bewley and the company made many friends during their stay in Charlottetown who will wish them every success. The play certainly promises well, and will undoubtedly have a good run in the province.

CONTRACTORS TO BLAME.—An Ottawa despatch says: King, Arnoldi and Suther and of Ottawa, gave evidence in an investigation today into the tragedy at Van-leek Hill, in which Rev. John McLeod and two others were killed. They said the stone used as backing was very bad. The mortar used was faulty. The building was not properly boarded and not carefully inspected.
