She flashed to the front with the word "go" and finished more than a length ahead of Vivian Strong 2.14, driven by A. Burnie, time 2.15. She is owned by Ray MacCallum, York, P.E.I.

In the D Pace, Sister Dawn, driven by Joe Hennessey, went a nice race closely pressed by Ken's Pride, driven by Lorne Kelly. She lowered her record from 2.17 2-5 to 2.15 3-5. Dashes 3 and 6, another D Pace, was a great fight between USCita's Boy and Peter Federal, with USCita's Boy winning the 3rd by a head; Peter Federal (H. Stead) 2, time 2.17 3-5. Peter Federal won the 6th dash with the same field with Propane (Kenny) 2, time 2.17 1-5.

USCita's Boy was driven by Horace Willis and is owned by Henderson and Willis. Peter Federal owned by Mapco Stable, Summerside.

The A Pace was perhaps the best on the program, with little Ginger E., driven by Lorne Kelly, coming through a winner, with Jolly Dick (Poulton) right at his neck, time 2.14. **No Contract Yet Signed**

MONCTON (CP)—Manager Chris Shaban said Tuesday he has not signed a contract for Yvon Durelle to defend his British Empire light-heavyweight boxing title against South African champion Mike Holt.

The amiable manager of the Bate Ste. Anne, N.B., fighter-fisherman was commenting on a report from Pretoria, South Africa that Durelle and Holt would meet for the title in Montreal in July.

Shaban said there is a possibility Durelle might be matched against world champion Archie Moore in Vancouver in August. He says Durelle has until Aug. 30 to defend his Empire crown which he won last May from Gordie Wallace of Bradford, Ont.

Durelle has never fought the South African champion. Shaban said Durelle could still take on Moore and be eligible to defend his Empire crown against Holt, providing the dates did not conflict.

At Montreal boxing promoter Eddie Quinn said he is negotiating for a Durelle-Holt match in the Montreal baseball park Wednesday.

Quinn said negotiations may be completed shortly and that he is expecting a cable from South Africa concerning terms. They were not announced.

**Jack Tighe Fired As Tigers' Coach**

MONCTON (AP)—Nice guy Jack Tighe was fired Tuesday as manager of the last-place Detroit Tigers and the club dug into the league for a new field manager.

Bill Norman, a 47-year-old Jack-of-all-trades who has been a scout and manager in a system about five years, was recently named as manager at Detroit, W. Va., in the American Association.

Tighe was manager of Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League for the second half of the season.

Tighe, 44, had the manager's job for two seasons. Named successor Buckley Harris after the 1956 campaign, Tighe directed the Tigers to a first-place finish last year for the first time in seven years. Like many American League clubs this season, the Tigers never were able to get rolling.

Tuesday they were 12½ games behind the league-leading New York Yankees.

**POTENTIAL**

General Manager John McHale joined the club in Boston at Tuesday, summoned Tighe to a meeting a few hours later at his office in Detroit made the announcement.

"Jack gave it everything he had," McHale said, "but it just didn't work out."

"I think our club has greater potential than it has shown to date," said McHale. "That potential wasn't being realized so we made the change for the good of everybody concerned."

Tighe, a popular manager who frequently talked himself into touchy situations, said he was relieved at the news.

"I'm surprised, to a degree but not too much, tough," he said.

Norman was coach of the Maple Leafs in 1946 and moved up to manager when Harry Davis, former Detroit first baseman, was fired as manager. He was replaced in 1947 and moved to St. Louis where he coached the old Browns.

Norman managed six years in the minors for Cleveland Indians and the Browns before joining the Detroit organization in 1954. As a manager, Norman had first-place finishes with Wilkes-Barre in 1950 and 1951. His Charleston club currently is in second place.

Norman joined the Tigers in time for Tuesday night's game here. McHale said the club has offered Tighe another job in the organization and it is likely that Tighe, who already has some 20 years with the Detroit system, will accept it shortly.

McHale said all the coaches will be retained.

**SILAGE MAKING**

There is a tendency to consider grass silage as a standard product, however it is known that variations occur between silages within different classes of silage. High quality silage (1) is cut at an early stage to give a high percentage of protein and digestibility. (Just as the green is coming into bloom and the timothy heads are emerging from the leaf sheath.) (2) has moisture content of about 70 per cent to give a high dry matter content and thus high feed value per pound. (3) is made from a mixture of grasses and legumes to ensure a sweet smell and silage.

The most favourable conditions for desirable silage fermentation are provided: (a) by storing the crop with a moisture content between 70 per cent and 75 per cent. (b) by having storage temperature between 30 deg. and 40 deg. F. (c) by exclusion of air.

After the silo is filled daily chopping should be continued for 10 to 15 days before covering. Generally, if the material is a mixture of grasses and legumes a preservative is not considered necessary but, when the moisture is high in legumes, a preservative may be used as insurance for the production of good silage. Molasses at 60 lbs. per ton or ground oats or ground barley 150-200 lbs. per ton have been very satisfactory as preservatives.

Surface spoilage in horizontal type silos may be materially reduced by using a suitable cover such as sawdust, where it is readily available, ground lime - water, soil, etc.

**MOISTURE TESTS**

**GRAB TEST IN CHOPPED SILAGE** - Compress chopped silage tightly into ball between hands for 20-30 seconds and then release suddenly. Chopped silage should be equivalent to a cutter sample of ¼ to 3-8 inch.

**CONDITION OF FORAGE**

Moisture indicates approximate stage in Moisture Content.

When the ball holds its shape there is considerable free moisture - Over 75 per cent.

When the ball holds its shape there is very little free juice - 70 per cent to 75 per cent.

When the ball falls apart slowly there is no free juice - 65 per cent to 70 per cent.

**MASTITIS**

Mastitis is expensive to treat, and there is an additional loss through damage to valuable cows and heifers. It has been the cause of removing far too many good cows from the milking line before they have reached maturity and can give their best. A simple definition of Mastitis is the inflammation of the udder through any cause. Usually there are visible changes in the milk but not always.

Research and other investigations have shown that care and maintenance of the milking machine will help to control the disease. If a machine is functioned properly, its action is more like that of a nursing calf than the hand milking method. If the machine is faulty, it becomes a
