YESTERDAY'S FOOTBALL GAME

Won by the Abegwits.

As was expected yesterday's football game resulted in a victory for the Abegwits. The day was not all that could be desired for a fast open game. The clouds of the morning looked threatening, but in the afternoon the sun came out strongly and tended to dazzle the eyes of the men who faced it. Directly down the field from the direction of the North River blew a strong, high wind, marsh-laden and raw. The ground, however, was in excellent condition, and fortunately no one was injured. Over six hundred spectators assembled to witness the contest, a large portion being ladies. The contest turned in Captain McGowan's favor and he placed his men where they would have the advantage of sun and wind. It looked for a moment as if the Abegwits were to be completely trampled on. Murnahan and Macdonald, their two heavy forwards, were not present, and Reg. Ryan and Ollie McEchern went on in their places. Jim McMillan, owing to a weak tendon, was unable to play, and Addison Miller, the old Crescent hero who has not handled the pigskin for six years, went on the half-back line. Miller's play all through the game showed that what he didn't know about the game wasn't worth knowing. He played with his usual excellent judgment, and repeatedly gained ground. Although not in training, he did excellent work—in fact he could not have done better—and his strong dashes, kicking and tackling were much admired.

At 3:30 Bethune kicked off for the Abbies. The ball was returned down the field, but by a succession of close scrimmages and short quick dashes by Miller and Bethune it was gradually worked back. The forwards did some swift following up. Darke, McKinnon and the McQuillans doing exceptionally good work in this respect. In vain the college quarters tried to get the ball back to their halber. Lou M. Millan and Trainor, the Abbies' quarters, and their speedy forwards were invariably with the ball, and tackled in quick order. Several free kicks were awarded the Collegians owing to the Abbies' foul play, but the ball was kept well in College territory. Arthur Sullivan saved on several occasions by quick punts into touch. Finally Bethune, who played a saving game all through, received the ball from Miller and kicked high over the college line. McEchern was right with it and secured it. He fell with a dozen Collegians on him, and when the smoke cleared away referee Sullivan announced a touch down for the Abbies. No goal was kicked. Score—Abbies 3; College 0.

During the remainder of the half, Blake and McGowan did some clever kicking, and McGowan attempted to run, but the Abbies' backs were sure tacklers. Once McLean almost got over the Abbie's line but he was caught before he went too far. The most sensational play of the game was made just before half time when called. Ritchie received the ball from the scrimmage and by a magnificent run across the field he scored a touchdown. It was a splendid play—one of Harry's usual dashes—and received well merited applause. No goal was kicked. Score, Abbie 6, College 0.

The second half was a series of scrimmages, and there was no open play. Ritchie tried his runs across the field, but could not get ground. Lou McMillan and Bethune carried the ball to the College goal line, but a free kick brought it back. The Collegians played well together and the half ended without further scoring. For the Collegians Keough, Cameron, Seiler and Strong played well, and followed up in good style. The backs, all played well, and McFadyen at full back was all that could be desired. The Abbies' quarters, Lou McMillan and Trainor, never played better, while the other men were up to their usual standard.

Mr. J. M. Sullivan referred to the satisfaction of all Messrs. Vernon Shaw and Jas. McMillan made capable touch judges.

It is probable that a match will be played in the near future between S. Davies' and the Abegwits.
