Eddie Lopat Turns In 7th Victory Without Defeat

Eddie Lopat, who throws "plenty of nothing," turned in his seventh victory without a defeat Sunday, pitching New York Yankees to a 7-3 decision over St. Louis Browns.

It was the first game of a scheduled American League doubleheader. The second game was rained out.

Lopat slow-balled the Browns on eight hits going the distance for the seventh time. He also boomed out his third home run of the season in the sixth inning. The Yankees sealed the verdict in the fifth when Joe DiMaggio socked a two-run homer.

Lopat now has an earned-run average of 1.26.

Philadelphia Phillies climbed out of the National League cellar by stinging Pittsburgh 7-0 in the first game of a doubleheader and smashing out a 12-4 victory in the second tilt.

The Pirates' loss in the opener was the worst shelling taken by any club in the league this year. It also was one of the biggest shutouts on record. The National League record shutout is a 19-0 defeat Chicago plastered on New York Giants in 1906. In 1901 Detroit Tigers blanked Cleveland 21-0 to establish the American League record.

Dickson, the Pirates' hard-luck pitcher, could have had a shutout going into the seventh except for one error behind him. But in the seventh the roof fell in as the Phillies scored eight runs. They added two in the eighth and four in the ninth for good measure, three of the latter on Mike Gollia's homer.

Chicago's pesky White Sox nosed out Washington Senators 5-4 to remain two games behind the Yanks in the American League. Ed Robinson doubled home Orestes Minoza from second base with two out in the ninth to break up the game. Robinson also hit a two-inning homer in the fifth. Ken Cammbe went the distance to pick up his third victory.

Hal Newhouse pitched Detroit Tigers to an 8-4 victory over the Red Sox in Boston. The triumph was Newhouse's fourth straight.

Island Odds And Ends

All over the Province those who have watched with dismay the deterioration of fishing and shooting, will perk up considerably because of the appointment as Provincial Game Warden of Spurgeon Jenkins. Known already for his courageous attempts to enforce the fish and game laws, as a long time member of the "Mounties," his new position is really a continuation of his former one, with wider powers and a new boss. It can therefore be assumed that unless this experienced and conscientious official meets with interference—and it has been known to happen—flouters of the game laws will be more wary in the days ahead. Trout fishermen particularly are highly pleased with the Jenkins appointment, and it can be guessed that those who have been engaged in wholesale netting, jigging and spearing, will be somewhat worried.

There is little doubt that trout are not as plentiful as they were, ten or twenty years ago mainly due to illegal fishing methods. It is true that more people than ever before are fishing, and that the automobile age has made every stream or pond on the Island easily accessible to numerous fishermen. But it is equally true that more money and effort to re-stock streams and ponds is being expended and that our open seasons are shorter by two months than formerly. On balance then our trout should be holding their own.

The strange thing about the lawless destruction of our game fish is the brazen way in which those responsible work. In every district where fish are netted or jigged, the law-breakers are known but seldom reported. It is hoped that Warden Jenkins will give such co-operation that these hitherto immune violators will be hooked, netted or jigged, and finally "jugged".

The annual closing of Prince of Wales College recalled to a former student and one of the oldest living ex-Princes of Wales men, that the institution was quite a place even in the old days. The investigation which followed, to uncover the boy who threw the apple, was earth-shaking, and even after seventy years still mirth-provoking to one who saw the incident.

Mr. Morrison left the College in '79 with the intention of going to Australia in the spring of 1880. He was persuaded meantime to take a job in Charlottetown's first telephone office and when spring came was promoted to the position of operator. He stayed on the job forty-four years, retiring in 1924. Strangely enough he had never given up his idea of going to Australia, and while making a world tour in 1925 he made Australia his principal stop-over. It was only for a visit and not as a permanent resident, as he had planned as a student at Prince of Wales.
