U.S. Tightens Defences, Orders Navy Force To Sea

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. military commanders around the world have been alerted to tighten their defence readiness, the joint chiefs of staff disclosed Wednesday night.

With an eye on Russian moves in Europe and the tense situation in the Middle East, the joint chiefs have cancelled some naval training manoeuvres, reduced training activities of the strategic air force to keep it assembled for instant action, and taken similar steps in the army.

Repeating to questions about the situation a spokesman for the joint chiefs said: "On virtually a daily basis, the joint chiefs have been keeping their major commanders advised of developments in the world situation and have been giving them guidance as to preparatory measures to increase the nation's defence readiness, with the emphasis on 'defence'."

HALIFAX (CP)—The navy said Wednesday that the aircraft carrier Magnificent has been recalled from Glasgow, Scotland, to be refitted for possible service in the Middle East.

WILL BE DRAWN FROM HOME FORCES

Canada Offers 1,000 Men For United Nations Force

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada has offered to field a 1,000-man force in the Middle East to help preserve the peace for the United Nations.

The Canadian aircraft carrier Magnificent will act as a mobile support base in the Mediterranean for the force, which will be flown overseas by RCAF transport planes.

The RCAF announced it will move 435 squadron of C-119 Flying Boxcars from Edmonton to the East to assist, if needed, the North Star aircraft of air transport command in the lift.

Though the United States had offered originally to transport UN troops to the Middle East, it became apparent that the U.S. will have nothing to do with the UN force for fear that Russia will demand a hand in things.

Mr. St. Laurent's statement said: "Canada will be prepared to have this force lifted by the RCAF to the Middle East."

RUSSIANS AGAIN THREATEN

Shooting And Arab-Red Demands Threaten Truce

LONDON (CP)—Shooting ripped through Port Said Wednesday night despite the cease-fire invoked by Britain and France along the occupied Suez Canal sides at 2 a.m. (Egyptian time).

Cairo late Wednesday saying: "The French and British armed forces are continuing their hostile military action and are firing at both military and civilians."

Cairo radio advised Egyptians to resume fighting "if the enemy advances one inch."

U. N. Approves Police Force For Service In Middle East

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—The United Nations Wednesday night approved a Canadian-suggested police force to move into the Middle East despite complications created by Israel's refusal to give up ground gained in the fighting with Egypt.

This statement on British policy superseded an earlier speech in London by Prime Minister Eden who refused to say whether British troops would leave Egypt if the UN insisted on excluding British troops from the police force.

Russian All-Out Attack Is Launched On Hungarian City

VIENNA (Reuters)—The Russian army Wednesday night was reported to have launched an all-out attack with planes and tanks against Hungarian insurgent forces holding out in the area of the steel city of Dunapentele, south of Budapest.

Another insurgent radio broadcast Wednesday reported the Russians have been dropping incendiary bombs on Hungarians holding out in Budapest, the Hungarian capital.

Democrats Win The No. 2 Prize In U.S. Election

WASHINGTON (CP)—The Democrats, denied their goal of a White House victory in Tuesday's general election balloting, have walked off with the No. 2 political prize—control of Congress for the next two years.
