Local and Other Items.

Jules Simon has openly declared himself the enemy of Gambetta.

THE "Narragansett" was raised on the 13th inst., and is now being repaired at New London, Conn.

JUDGE AND MRS. KELLY entertained a large number of the elite of Summerside by a ball at their residence on Tuesday evening last.

The Russian General Kaufmann has been ordered to Eastern Siberia with 14,000 men to clear the district infested by brigands and Chinese immigrants.

THE Queen of Spain has had another epidemic fit. She has been subject to them since the attempt to assassinate the King, in her presence, a few months since.

THE tour of the Canadian cricketers has ended, and all appointments have been abandoned. Three of the team left in the steamer "Moravian," and the remainder will follow in the course of next week.

THE Lorne Hotel is certainly growing famous. On Saturday the proprietor was unable to accommodate the large number of guests for the night; and on Sunday eighty-five persons sat down to dinner.

VINEGAR FOR THE ISLAND.—O. V. Troop, Esq., vinegar manufacturer, arrived home from Halifax yesterday morning, after a business trip of two weeks on P. E. Island, during which time he sold 120 barrels of prize vinegar, each barrel averaging 50 gallons. He is to be congratulated on opening up such a good market. Though originally a free trader, Mr. Troop is now a firm believer in the National Policy, as calculated to build up this Canada of ours.—St. John Sun.

FATAL AND SAD ACCIDENT.—On Thursday last, at Mount Pleasant, Lot 12, Mrs. McDonald, wife of Henry McDonald, of that place, met an untimely death, under very distressing circumstances. It appears that she and her husband were in the field hoeing potatoes; in this field was an old tree around which a lot of rubbish had been piled and set on fire, with the intention, we suppose, of consuming it. Mrs. McDonald had occasion to pass by this tree, not suspecting any danger, but sad to write, just as she was passing the old tree, weakened by the fire, fell, killing Mrs. McDonald, we are told, instantly.—S. Progress.

CHASED BY SHARKS IN BEDFORD BASIN.—Warren Smith and Ham, while out practising in their shell on the Basin, a day or two ago, were chased by a large shark, and the race they rowed was one well calculated to try their speed had anyone been at hand with a watch. The shark several times got so near that it turned on its back to seize one of the frail boats in its jaws, but the delay thus caused enabled the oarsmen to get away. They finally reached shoal water, where their blood-thirsty pursuer could not follow them. Ham was out alone, later in the day, and was again chased by a shark, but got out of the way. This will be cheerful news to those who bathe in the Basin.

CHALLENGE.—We hereby offer to match our pacing gelding "Donald" against Mr. Robt. Crabb's trotting gelding "Shylock," for a race of mile heats, best two in three, to harness, for \$100 a side. The race to take place at "P. E. Trotting Park," Charlottetown, P. E. I., within two weeks from date of accepting the challenge—weather and track permitting. If Mr. Crabb feels disposed to accept the challenge, he will please place \$25 of the \$100 in Dr. Strickland's hands, and notify us immediately, and we will cover it at once; the remaining \$75 to be deposited the day before the race.—G. With reference to the above challenge, which we quote from the Halifax Herald, Mr. Crabb authorizes us to state that he is not trotting pacers this year. However, he will agree to match his horse "Shylock" against the horse "Donald," formerly owned by him, but now owned by some parties in Halifax. If the horse "Donald," now owned by the Messrs. Sullivan, is the one sold by Mr. Muttart, of Summerside, to Mr. Coffin, of Halifax, there will be no difficulty in arranging the match for \$100 a side, best three in five. It is usual for challengers to place earnest money in the hands of the stakeholder named. If the Messrs. Sullivan have the horse which Mr. Crabb desires to trot, let them put up their earnest money, and Mr. Crabb will not lose time in covering it. We are further authorized to state, there are three horses in Queen's County, P. E. Island, which will trot any three horses in Halifax County for any sum from \$100 to \$500.

SHOOTING AT WIMBLEDON.—The shooting on the 12th at Wimbledon was very good. The weather was fine, and the wind uncertain, light and moderate. At the first range for the Queen's prize, Sergeant Graham scored 33 points and Stenhouse, Ogg and Mills 32. In the Daily Telegraph competition no Canadians were successful. The Brothers Graham and Barnhill each scored 32. The average shooting of the team was good. The Canadian have been making good scores. Lieut. Mills made 33 in the Alfred competition. Sergeant Stenhouse was counted out with the same score. Major Wilton made 32 in the first stage of the Alexandra. O'Grady, Ewen McDougall and Sargison made 31 each out of a possible 35. In the first stage of the Queen's, Private Graham of the 25th made 33, Mills, Ogg and Stenhouse, and Major Macpherson, Sargison and Bayley, 31 each. Several of the American team were going to Brussels to shoot in the international jubilee matches, beginning on the 15th inst., and continuing until August.

Canada Temperance Act.

We find the following in the Canada Gazette of the 10th inst.:

"His Excellency, on the recommendation of the Honorable the Secretary of State, has been pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the second part of the Canada Temperance Act, 1873, shall be in force and take effect in the said City of Charlottetown upon, from and after the day on which the annual or semi-annual licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors now in force in the said City will expire, provided such day be not less than ninety days from the date hereof, and if it be less, then on the like day in the following year.

Dr. Tanner.

Dr. Tanner has been weighed six times since he entered upon his fast, and the scales show that he is growing beautifully less by degrees. When he started on his go-as-you-please against starvation, he weighed 157 1/2 lbs., the temperature of his body was ninety-nine degrees, and his pulse averaged about eighty-eight. On the afternoon of the second day he was weighed once more and he tipped the beam at 153 lbs. The third time he got into the scale was on the fifth day, and his weight was 147 1/2 lbs. The next time was on the eighth day. This time he weighed 143 1/2 lbs. On the following day he went down to 141 1/2 lbs., and yesterday afternoon, the eleventh day of fasting, he showed 139 1/2 lbs. Thus he has decreased in the following manner:

Day	Weight (lbs.)

Fifth day	147 1/2
Eighth day	143 1/2
Ninth day	141 1/2
Tenth day	139 1/2
Eleventh day	139 1/2

No accurate record has been kept of the amount of sleep taken by Dr. Tanner during the first eleven days of the ordeal. He drops off into a doze often five or ten minutes at a time, and again he will sleep soundly for four or five hours. He probably averages about six hours sleep out of every twenty-four. His favorite position in slumber is on his face, thereby compressing the stomach and preventing it from acquiring any balloon qualities which might be unpleasant. This morning he left his cot in the balcony on the main hall and lay down in his old bed in the centre of the hall. A number of persons were present at the time and regarded the faster with interest. They evidently did not believe the stories told of his "playing fast and loose" with the doctors. Later in the day there was some music, which the doctor enjoyed excessively. His confidence in his ability to complete his task continues unimpaired.

Serious Stabbing Affray.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 15.
A serious stabbing affray occurred last night, about midnight, on board the G. M. "Bachelors," now lying at the G. M. Association's pier, loading coal for St. John, N. B. She is from Ronen. A seaman, Geo. Flanagan, along with four others, were on deck about midnight, drunk and making a noise, and the first mate, Mr. Smith, was trying to keep them from going on shore to get more liquor, when this Flanagan stabbed the mate, it is supposed with a sheath knife. The knife entered above the right lung, going in a slanting position, downwards through the lung. The doctor says if it had gone in a straight line he would never have breathed again. Flanagan was arrested and lodged in jail. The other three were found in the woods in the morning, having deserted, and were also lodged in jail. Their trial comes off to-morrow. The mate is in a pretty bad condition.

The woman suffragists of the United States, though treated with scant courtesy by the two great political parties, still do not lose hope that their aspirations will be realized at no remote period. They will doubtless feel encouraged to persevere in their efforts when they hear that the negroes of Bolonda, in Africa, are advanced woman suffragists. Their women sit in the councils of state, bring their husbands to their villages when they marry, have the sole right of pronouncing a divorce and of retaining the children in that event, and govern the opposite sex in the smallest matters of domestic economy.
