Summerside Service Is Largely Attended

SUMMERSIDE — Despite rain and cool winds attendance was surprisingly large at most Remembrance Day Ceremonies in this area yesterday. At the ceremonies at the Memorial Square Cenotaph here, the general public, school children and parade units heard Rev. Dr. C. R. Webber speak on the importance of remembrance, which in its deepest meaning should lead to dedication that the dead for whom the ceremonies are held shall not have died in vain.

Mr. Webber is Protestant pastor of the local Legion branch. Preceding him in the ceremonies was Rt. Rev. Magr. J. P. E. O'Hanley, Roman Catholic Padre, who gave the prayer.

Mrs. Jack Watson, whose son was killed in Korea, represented all mothers of the war dead in laying the first wreath. She was escorted to the Cenotaph by Jack Walmsley, vice-president of the local Legion branch. Among others laying wreaths were Hon. T. Earle Hickey, representing the Provincial Government, Mayor Key representing the Town, David MacDonald, MP, Group Captain Grover Berry, commanding officer of Canadian Forces Base Summerside.

Legion president Ben J. Arsenault presided over the ceremonies and took the salute at the marchpast.

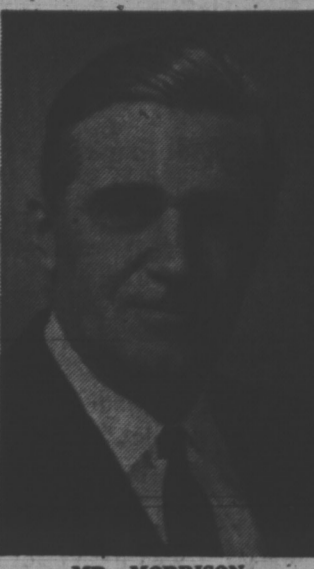

Mr. Morrison is president and general manager of a bearing and power transmission firm bearing his name in New Glasgow, N.S. He is a graduate of Dalhousie University and Nova Scotia Technical College, Halifax. He is a director of the Pictou County Research and Development Commission, chairman of the regional board of the Canadian Institute for the Blind, president of New Glasgow

Association and its present treasurer.

The visiting governor was elected to his present office in Denver, Colorado last June and will serve until June 30, 1967.

"While in Charlottetown," stated local Rotary president Mr. Hunter, "the governor of our district will talk with us about possible growth of membership and the likelihood of forming additional Rotary clubs in nearby communities. His visit will also give us a broader understanding of worldwide Rotary organization that today embraces over 600,000 men of practically all nationalities and political and religious beliefs."

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to office of Rotary governor, Mr. Morrison attended a one-day meeting last June in New York State, at which all Rotary governors for 1966-67 received intensive training for their jobs.

One of his biggest tasks will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary clubs in his area.

MONTAGUE — Montague and area veterans turned out yesterday for what is believed the largest parade held in recent years. Although warm rain prevailed the complete program was carried out. The parade formed up at the legion home where comrade Raymond Dewar placed a wreath on the memorial plaque. Led by the RCMP, and Town Police. Veterans Of Two Wars Honor Fallen Comrades

Veterans of both world wars and the Korean conflict and other citizens gathered at the Cenotaph in downtown Charlottetown yesterday morning under cloudy and overcast skies to pay tribute to Canada's war dead. The ceremony was one of the largest ever attended in Charlottetown.

Veterans began their Remembrance Day services with a parade at 10.40 from the Legion Home where they were joined by provincial and civil dignitaries along with a large crowd of spectators, at the Cenotaph.

Flags DIPPED
Following the playing of O Canada shortly before 11 o'clock, the Last Post was sounded, signalling the two-minute silence. Flags of the Royal Canadian Legion Color Party were dipped in tribute. Comrade Charles Ryan, president of the Charlottetown Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion recited from Binyon's poem, "They Shall Grow Not Old".

Following this Reveille was sounded and the hush was broken as flags were raised. A prayer was then given by Rev. James Kelly, followed by remarks by Rev. J.G. Ryley.

Car Snaps Off Telephone Pole

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Large Parade In Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — Under grey skies and rain squalls Remembrance Day was observed in Georgetown with an exceptionally large parade of veterans, Ladies Auxiliary, Lions, Boy Scouts, school children and citizens.

War veterans from Cardigan joined in the Georgetown parade as they do each year to honor the dead of two world wars.

The parade moved off from King's Theater headed by Constable Charles Jackson in the Georgetown police patrol car. The parade marshal Louis Yoston with Comrade Raymond Lavandier and Stillman Mair formed the color party.

At the War Memorial two boy scouts, Kenneth Walker and Lloyd Murphy, stood with staffs and bowed heads while the school children sang O Canada. The Last Post was sounded by bugler Pat King of Charlottetown, the two minutes silence was observed and the bugler sounded the Reveille. The prayer was read by Father L.B. Dooley, then followed the poem "They Shall Grow Not Old" recited by Mrs. Marcellus Gotsell, president of the ladies' auxiliary. The honor roll of those who made the supreme sacrifice in the two world wars was read by Mrs. Frank MacLean.
