LORD SALISBURY'S OPINION.

Reassuring Statement of the Premier.

Hope That There Will Not be a General European War.

LONDON, May 7.—The annual meeting of the Primrose League was held yesterday. Lord Salisbury discussing the Greco-Turkish question said that the main object of the European concert was to prevent a European war, adding that the belief prevailed that all danger of such a war was finally dissipated, and the peace of Europe, apart from the local conflict, had been placed on a better basis and had a better hope in its future than ever before.

Her Majesty's Government, the Premier said, would do its best to end the bloodshed. In his concluding references to the war Lord Salisbury said: "The opening of the eastern question was greatly dreaded, but it has now gone like a nightmare. There has been great terror that any outbreak in the southeast of Europe might lead to a general blaze. But it is to be hoped that the danger is past and that we may look calmly on the larger interests involved."

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

COLD STORAGE AT CHARLOTTETOWN.

A Monthly Steamship to be Provided.

Good for the Government.

OTTAWA, May 7.—In the agricultural committee yesterday forenoon, Professor Robertson outlined fully the cold storage programme.

Arrangements have been made for the coming summer to provide storage equipment in seventeen steamships sailing from Montreal. Arrangements have also been made for storage accommodation on steamships sailing fortnightly from Halifax and St. John, and for a monthly service from Charlottetown. The extra charge for cold storage freight is to be 12 cents per 100 pounds.

In the House of Commons, yesterday afternoon, the Opposition won a partial triumph over the Postmaster-General, who, after a long debate, consented to give an investigation to the Beausville postmaster who was dismissed without an inquiry, and who has been hitherto refused a hearing.

Malcolm & Ross have secured the charter of the Restigouche and Western Railway from Baie des Chaleurs, at Campbellton, to St. Leonard, on the St. John River. It is proposed to cross the river at Vanceboro and connect the line with the Baigor and Aroostock road.

PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

British Government Considering

Advisability of Renouncing Commercial Treaties Containing "Most Favored Nations Clause."

LONDON, May 7.—In the House of Commons yesterday the Secretary of the Foreign Office, replying to a question as to whether in consequence of the tariff proposals of the Canadian Government, the Government of Great Britain was considering the advisability of renouncing the treaties of commerce with Great Britain, France, Germany and Belgium said that the matter was receiving the careful consideration of the Government, but he was unable to make a statement at present.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 6.—Manitoba's population was yesterday increased by the arrival of two special trains over the Canadian Pacific containing new settlers. In the two trains were about one thousand and two hundred souls, nearly all Galicians, the balance being Hungarians and Poles. Local members of the immigration staff were kept busy answering inquiries and directing the newcomers, who are healthy and promising settlers. All of them have more or less money, and besieged the Montreal bank during the day to cash their bills of exchange. Considerable sums were spent by the new arrivals in the city for farm tools, provisions, etc., and in addition many of them had large quantities of effects, as the depot platform was crowded with boxes and bundles of luggage.
