Captain Of Argosy Released On Bail

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Sept. 28—(CP)—The captain and mate of the globe-girdling ketch Argosy yesterday were released on bail after being charged with smuggling arms and ammunition into Trinidad.

Capt. Dod Osborne, famed for his gun-running exploits in the Grimby trawler Girl Pat in 1936, and John Hodgkins were arrested Wednesday night shortly before their 80-foot vessel was seized by a police raiding party and towed to berth. Four crew members also were taken into custody.

Capt. Osborne told authorities Sept. 9 he was on a scientific expedition seeking curative herbs in southern climates. After visiting West Indian colonies and South American countries, he planned to go to New Zealand.

The men were charged with smuggling chemical guns, shotguns and 4,000 rounds of ammunition into the colony. The British skipper said he was carrying the chemical guns to test them for American firms.

The Argosy was boarded and searched Sept. 14 by an armed American naval squad under supervision of U. S. Consul General Robert Hale. Osborne said at the time the search was because he was suspected of smuggling guns to Venezuela.

Capt. Osborne made front page headlines for weeks in 1936 when he disappeared with the trawler Girl Pat. He was finally arrested in British Guiana waters after dodging searchers across the Atlantic.

KILLED IN MANOEUVRES

HANOVER, Germany, Sept. 27—(Reuters)—Five British servicemen have been killed in accidents during the British Rhine army exercises in the Bremen-Hanover area, it was disclosed today. One was electrocuted, three died in tank accidents, and a guardsman died when a train hit his truck.
