Oklahoma Law Prohibits Masks

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—It may be fashionable for women to wear a fancy hat with a mask attached. But if the laws are rigidly enforced, it could be expensive in Oklahoma. Wearing a mask attached to a woman's hat is a crime punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$500 fine. That's not quite as stiff as the punishment for wearing a topless bathing suit—assuming that last particular new fashion is covered by the law of indecent exposure. Indecent exposure carries a penalty of \$10 to \$1,000 plus 30 days to a year.

Some fashion experts have decreed the hats that look like masks—or maybe they're masks that look like hats—very practical for cold weather. That they might be, but Oklahoma law clearly says, "It shall be unlawful for any person in this state to wear a mask, hood or covering, which conceals the identity of the wearer."
