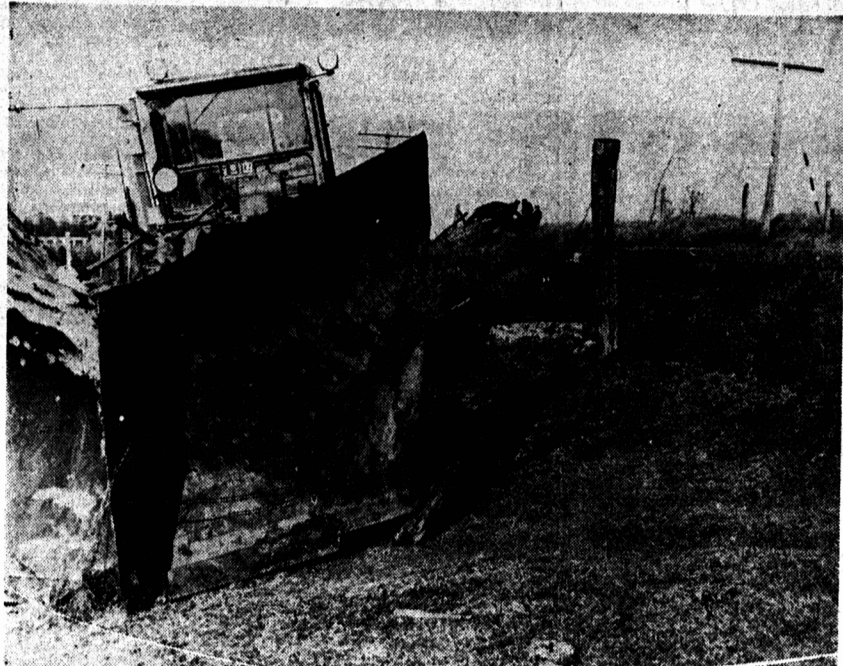

Scene At Highway Accident



Seen above is the snow plow involved in the accident with a car near Miscouche, on Thursday evening, when Joseph Shields was killed, and Gilbert Arsenault was seriously injured. Immediately following the collision between the two vehicles, the plow left the road, broke off an electric light pole, and went through a fence. The car, seen on a high embankment at the right of the plow, also left the highway after contact with the snow plow. It struck a ditch, climbed the bank, went through a fence and the corner of a field before coming to rest on top of another fence. Both men in the car were found some distance away where it is presumed they were thrown. A section of the scraper blade is seen to have been broken off the bottom of the snow plow. The passing of the Summerside team was particularly poor, with the Air Force girls getting about 75 per cent of their baskets after intercepting poor Summerside passes.

Norboro Man Injured In Accident On Road

Mr. Walter Hughes of Norboro, escaped serious injury last evening when his late model Nash sedan, travelling eastward, skidded a considerable distance on pavement at the western approach to the town of Kensington, and was badly demolished when it crashed side-on against a telephone pole. Mr. Hughes, reported to have been unconscious for a time following the accident, was said to have escaped with slight injuries and shock. The skidding car apparently struck the telephone pole broadside, at a point just back of the front seat, and the force of impact moulded the shape of the telephone pole a considerable distance towards the inside center of the car. The car apparently began its skid while travelling on its proper side of the road, near a point where the new highway joins the old at the western side of Kensington. Skid marks indicated that it gradually turned sideways as it crossed the road on an angle and was stopped by the telephone pole. - S.

Condition Of Injured Man Remains Serious

Hospital authorities at Summerside said last night that the condition of Mr. Gilbert Arsenault, who was injured in the car accident in which Joseph Shields was killed on Thursday night, was still very serious. It was at first believed that he had a fractured skull but it was learned last night that this was not the case. However, although not yet known for certain, it is feared that he is suffering from a broken back. The condition of the various members of the Gallant family who were so severely burned on Thursday night last was reported as favorable. Bandages on some of the victims were being removed yesterday and their condition was said to be as good as could be expected after their harrowing experience. - S. Let's Talk It Over

There's a superstition in baseball that if you speak of a pitcher's working on a no-hit game, you are likely to put the "whammy" on him, and the next batter will get a hit off him. We hope this doesn't hold true with observations of the weather, for certainly the weather man is working on a no-hitter as far as winter storms in Prince Edward Island are concerned. Last year about this time, the civic authorities had conceded defeat in their fight to keep Summerside sidewalks open. The pedestrian thoroughfares went into hibernation, and did not re-appear until Old Sol, together with his henchmen, the wind and the rain, brought them back into circulation. This year, virtually no work has been done on sidewalk clearance for a different reason. There has been no work to do. February may bring the horse plow and the shovellers, in addition to the groundhog, but December and January go down in the records as the mildest and finest ever.
