

Maple Leafs, Red Wings Win Saturday NHL Games

TORONTO. (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs scored two quick goals in the first period to defeat the first-place Montreal Canadiens 3-1 in a National Hockey League game before 14,288 fans, the largest crowd here this year.

The Leafs, in third place and three points behind the Canadiens, took advantage of a tripping penalty to defenseman Dollard St. Laurent at 2:22 of the first period to beat goalkeeper Gerry McNeil.

From then on the Leafs bottled the Montrealers until the last five minutes, when defenseman Harry Lumley made good saves on right-winger Maurice Richard, defenseman Doug Harvey and center Elmer Lach.

Center Rudy Migay, left-winger Ed Smith and left-winger Harry Watson scored for the Leafs. Defense centre Johnny McCormack called the only Montreal goal when he beat Lumley in the second period.

It was the second time in four meetings this year that the Leafs beat the Canadiens.

DETROIT. (CP)—Right-winger Gordie Howe and defenseman Red Kelly, with two goals apiece, helped make goalie Jack Gelineau's return to the National Hockey League a miserable one Saturday night as they led Detroit Red Wings to a runaway 9-0 victory over Chicago Black Hawks. The total was the highest by one team this season.

Gelineau, rookie of the year in 1949-50 when he broke in with Boston Bruins, was substituting for Al Rollins who is sidelined with a case of chicken pox.

Gelineau's worst moments came late in the second period when the Red Wings scored four times in three minutes and 43 seconds. The sub goalie's only consolation was that it was no record for fast scoring.

New York Rangers set the mark for the fastest three goals in two minutes and 10 seconds against Chicago in 1952.

Besides getting two goals, Kelly was in on three others for a total of five points. Howe got an assist in addition to his two scores.

Other Detroit scorers were Johnny Wilson, Vic Stasiuk, Metro Pystik, Marty Pavelich and Bill Dineen.

Goalie Terry Sawchuk of Detroit registered his second straight shut-out and fourth of the season.

Grey Cup Highlights

TORONTO. (CP)—The last-play effort of Winnipeg Blue Bombers Saturday to overhaul Hamilton Tiger-Cats was reminiscent of the 1947 Grey Cup final. This year the Bombers missed on a pass play six years ago they were defeated when Joe Krol gave Toronto Argos victory by kicking a single on the final play.

The weather for this year's classic was all that could be asked for. At kick-off time the sun was shining and the temperature was in the low 40s. The sun was overcast late in the game but broke through again before the finish. There was little wind.

Gross receipts hit an all-time high of \$168,000-\$128,000 from ticket sales and \$40,000 from radio, television, program and movie rights. Seventy radio stations, the largest network to carry a sports

event in Canada, broadcast a play-by-play description to all provinces except Newfoundland. The CBC-TV network brought it to viewers over its Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal stations.

Hugh Fullerton, Jr. of The Associated Press, New York, had a pressbox view of the game, the first sports writer sent by AP to cover a Grey Cup final.

Lester B. (Mike) Pearson, external affairs minister, should follow the example of Trade Minister Howe and take kicking lessons. Bareheaded Mike's honorary kickoff dribbled on the ground about six yards. Last year Mr. Howe received tips a week before the game and booted an 18-yarder, low but in the air.

Hamilton's girl cheerleaders—the Majorettes—put on the last-time show with the 48th Highlanders band of Toronto. The Majorettes had it all over Winnipeg's Bomberettes. The Bomberettes weren't even at Varsity Stadium. No tickets available, was the word. The Winnipeg girls saw the game on television.

Scalpers were reported asking as high as \$50 for a single ticket shortly before game time. Prices in hotel lobbies the night before ranged from \$20 to \$30.

Killed After Fall From Car

MONTREAL. (CP)—Stephen N. Fascitelli, 49, of Burlington, Vt., was killed Thursday night when struck by an automobile after falling out of another car on a highway near Henryville, 20 miles southeast of Montreal.

Quebec Provincial Police said Fascitelli, a passenger in a car driven by Peter Corey, also of Burlington, fell out of the vehicle when the driver swerved to avoid hitting a cow.

Clarify Wilson Reference To German Subs

WASHINGTON. (AP)—A defence department spokesman says secretary Wilson didn't mean it literally when he said that, after the Second World War, "we were dumb enough to turn over the whole German submarine fleet to the Russians."

The spokesman said, in commenting on a story in the Washington Star, that Wilson meant giving some submarines to Russia supplied the Reds with technical data vital to building their present formidable fleet.

The Star said Wilson's recent statement was disputed by government records which show that, of 433 U-boats, 225 were scuttled and 213 destroyed by the Allies, with the remainder going to each to the United States, Britain and Russia. It said Russia may have gotten hold of 15 or so more on its own.

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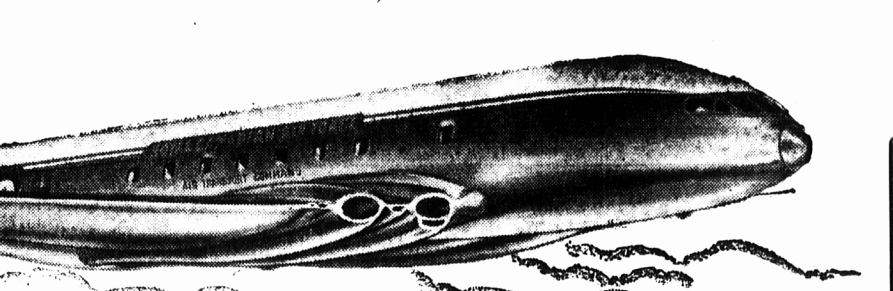
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CAPTAIN OF A COMET JET
