

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FIXING THE DATE.—The end of the world is to come on April 23rd, 1903, according to a German theologian, who has just alarmed Berlin by his prophecy. His cheerful forecasts are a great war in 1897, the advent of a new Napoleon in 1899, as King of Greece and Syria, and a terrific earthquake in 1901.

MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.—Petitions addressed to the Governor-General-in-Council, praying that the minority in Manitoba will be granted remedial legislation in the matter of schools, are being forwarded to Ottawa by the Roman Catholics of the various provinces of the Dominion. A petition to this effect is now open for signatures in Charlottetown.

THE EARLY ARTISTS IN CANADA.—Mr. Robert Harris gave a very interesting address in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon, under the auspices of the Woman's Art Association, on the subject of "The Early Artists of Canada." He treated his subject in a masterly manner, and the young artists present were much pleased.

BIBLE STUDY.—The meeting for Study of the Bible, held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors yesterday afternoon, under the leadership of Dr. Anderson, afforded ample assurance that this class is going to flourish in the community. Those present were unanimous in their expressions of approval and anticipate both profit and enjoyment for a continuance in the course. The only drawback being that the room may prove too small to contain those who desire to attend.

Don't miss the concert and basket social to be held in Crapaud Corner hall on Thursday, Feb. 7. The 52nd Batt. band gave the concert and the ladies of Crapaud supply the baskets. The proceeds are in aid of the Sunday School library at Crapaud Corner, and any person who enjoys a good drive and something good to eat afterwards should not miss the point of the present. Concert commences at 7 p. m. Admission 10c. Ladies bringing baskets admitted free.

THE UNEMPLOYED.—For the information of the St. John Record, it may be stated that a gentleman from Hillsboro was in Moncton a day or two ago, looking for work to go to work in the woods, but found them not. He had scoured Hillsboro, and had been unable to find a single man idle in all that village. He was willing to give 50 per cent more wages than the labor command when the Record's friends were in power. The great majority of the unemployed are of that class mostly found following the Grit party about election times for free run.—Moncton Times.

BURIED HIM ALIVE.—A horrible deed of vengeance is reported as having happened in the Koroza district in Russia. Kasimir Minkals was the chief of a band of brigands who had infested the district for over a year. Quite lately they murdered a priest, a servant and a landowner. Minkals had stolen two horses from the village of Lepizsk, and the peasants pursued him, caught him, and beat him almost to death. But as he still showed signs of life, they were for hanging him on a tree. One of the men, however, decided to bury him alive, and this was done. The dead body has been found, and seven persons have been arrested.

KILLED HIS SISTER.—An extraordinary story has just been told by a student to the head of the Paris Criminal Department, to the following effect: Some years ago, the young man's sister died suddenly at their home in the country, and he now asserts that he killed her by introducing a noxious gas through a tube into her bedroom as she lay asleep. The student explains that he yielded to a homicidal impulse, and that he has made this confession through the dread that he may be tempted to do further mischief. Doubts are entertained as to his sanity, but the investigation which is being held into the case so far leads to the impression that the girl was really killed by a poisonous gas.

ENTERTAINMENT AT HARBOR LIGHT.—A very successful and interesting concert was given at the Harbor Light, on Saturday night, by a number of ladies and gentlemen of considerable talent, under the direction of Mr. J. E. Welsh. The place was crowded with a very attentive audience, who, seemed, by the continued rounds of applause, to be delighted with the whole evening's proceedings. A special feature of the programme was a harmonica duet by two young ladies, the Masters Payne, which delighted all who heard it. It is intended to give a similar concert on a larger scale in a short time. SUPREME COURT.

FEBRUARY 2, 1895. James McKenna vs. James Field.—Action of trespass to land. Verdict for the defendant.

FEBRUARY 4, 1895. The Queen vs. Wallace Rice.—Indictment for assault on his wife. Sentenced to three calendar months in the common jail.

The Queen vs. William McDaniel.—Indictment for attempting to obtain money by false pretences. Sentenced to eighteen calendar months in common jail with hard labor.

George Bell vs. Daniel Reardon.—Action in trover for value of cow. Tried this term. Verdict for plaintiff for \$18.25. Mr. Davies, Q. C., moves for a rule nisi to set aside the verdict and for a non-suit, and obtains a rule returnable 12th of February.

H. D. Wallman vs. the City of Charlottetown.—Mr. Peters obtains a rule nisi to set aside the non-suit directed by the Chief Justice.

James McKenna vs. James Field.—Mr. Morson moves for rule nisi for new trial upon the ground that the verdict was against the weight of evidence. Court refused a rule.

George Dixon vs. James Gorman.—Mr. D. C. McLeod moves for and obtains a rule nisi for new trial, returnable Easter Term, upon several grounds, among which was that one of the jurors was a relation of the plaintiff within the prohibited degrees.

The court then adjourned until the 12th.

BELFAST HIGH SCHOOL.—The trustees of the Belfast High School received on the 20th ult. from the secretary of the Board of Education a notice ratifying the statements made by Mr. D. J. McLeod a year ago concerning the advanced rank of the above mentioned school.

THEY SENT HIM BACK.—Alex. McConnell, of Manitoba, was recently appointed principal of a school in Minot, North Dakota. Supporters of other candidates for the position discovered that McConnell was a Canadian, and under the alien law, secured at Washington, an order for his deportation from the United States. On Wednesday they ordered him to leave and made sure that he left by accompanying him across the boundary.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, Charles Watling was convicted of a second violation of the Canada Temperance Act and fined \$100 and \$8.50 costs or two months imprisonment. Robert Crawford was convicted of three violations of the same Act and for each conviction was fined \$50 and costs or two months imprisonment. The cases against George Mutch and Francis McKenna were further adjourned for a second trial. Henry McEwen was fined \$25 or 10 days for assaulting Harry Horne. James Doherty was fined \$3 and 20 days for drunkenness, and Norman Valley \$1 or 4 days for a similar offence.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—A despatch to the Star from Che Foo says the Chinese lost 2,700 men in the operations at Wei Hai Wei which resulted in the capture of that place by the Japanese. None of the Europeans in the city were injured. The Chinese still hold the island of Ting Kang Tau, near Wei Hai Wei, upon which are a number of government workshops defended by strong fort works. A despatch from Tokio says: General Nogi reports from Kaiping, under date Jan. 31, that the enemy in the vicinity of Ying Kow exceeded 20,000 men. Scouts report that the Chinese occupied Looyabio. The enemy west of that place is gradually advancing southwards. Advices from Hai Chang report no Chinese troops on the Chiwang roads. All quiet at Fengyang.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 1.—A special from the City of Mexico says: Since great earthquakes in November, 1893, which caused the loss of fifteen lives in this city and destroyed thousands of dollars' worth of property, a reign of terror has prevailed in the towns of Jumieltete and Texcoco, state of Caxaca, where the earth has trembled six or eight times a day. Churches and houses' are heaps of ruins and the inhabitants have nearly all fled to neighboring hamlets. The eruption of some volcano, presumed to exist in subterranean parts close by, is momentarily expected. On Tuesday night earthquake shocks were felt in many places in the state of Caxaca.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1.—Lord Ripon, colonial secretary, has written Lord Aberdeen on behalf of the Imperial Government, expressive of the sense of the loss the Empire has sustained through the death of Sir John Thompson. Lord Ripon says the deceased statesman, while a strenuous supporter of the rights, and a profound believer in the future of Canada, was at the same time a loyal and eloquent advocate of everything that tended to the unity of the empire, and on other occasions he had rendered valuable service. With his personal character your lordship is, of course, much more familiar than myself. But even the brief acquaintance which I enjoyed with him impressed me with his genial temper and kindness of heart, his unassuming modesty, his candor and uprightness and unflinching courage in maintaining his convictions.
