WONDERFUL SEASON.—Says the Halifax Herald. This is a wonderful season. The provincial papers are filled with reports of Magpies, robins, and other flowers in full bloom, buds on trees, green strawberries and full blown blossoms, second crops of English beans in blossom, and gigantic turnips and carrots. Yermouth county seems to be ahead in these wonders.

NEW COMPANIES.—Notice is given in the Canadian Gazette of the intention to apply to Parliament for authority to construct a subway under Northumberland Straits, to connect Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick between Cape Fomentine and Traverses, and also intended application for letters patent to incorporate a Shipbuilding Company at New Glasgow, N. S., capital \$ 0,000, in \$100 shares.

A CORRESPONDENT at Souris, writing on the 14th inst., says:—The schooner Christina, Captain Smith, master, broke loose from her moorings about six o'clock this morning and drifted on the rocks near the west side of the wharf. She had a hole punched in her bottom, and when the Captain, who was ashore at the time, succeeded in boarding her, she had considerable water in her hold. With the aid of a Sampson post and two small pontoons she was got off and pumped out. Captain Smith will at once proceed to the Gut where he will have her placed on the slip and her bottom repaired. On her return here she will take in a cargo of potatoes for Macdonald's, Macdonald & Co.

SKELETON FOUND.—The Amherst correspondent of the Moncton Times writes:—The bones of a human being were found on Wednesday, the 18th inst., in the woods near the River, Cumberland Co., by two men who were hunting for timber in that vicinity. The body had evidently been there for years, as the fleshy parts had entirely disappeared. The bones were intact. Only remnants of the clothing were visible and a soft felt hat. No boots or moccasins could be found. There was a belt, as if around the body, about where the vest pocket would be, and near which were found two twenty-five cent coins and a remnant of a paper bill. The hat was lying about three feet from the skull. The matter was reported to Coroner Dr. Black, of this town, who desires any one who has any knowledge of any man missing within the last three or four years, to report to him.

PREBYTERIAN SERVICES AT HIGHWOOD BAY. Next Sabbath, 29th November, the services will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Howie at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. In the afternoon at 3:30, Lot 14. On Monday evening (D. V.) Mr. Howie gives a lecture, "From Jerusalem to Bethlehem," in Lot 14 Church. He may appear in Eastern garb. Mr. Howie is a native of Mount Lebanon, and a grandson of Rev. Michael L. Howie. He graduated in Edinburgh about two years ago. Possibly had studied brought about his loss of sight. Mr. Howie has been unable to see for more than five years; but, if we read him right, he regards it as something worse than annoyance to be always questioned on the subject of his loss of sight. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Servian War.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Advices from Isbrod state the weather there is terribly severe. Dragoman Pass is blocked with snow and the roads across the mountains are impassable.

The Drina Division forced their way through after a hard to hand struggle in Saturday's fight, and joined the main army before Slivniza.

Orders have been sent to B-grade to delay the formation of the second reserve division, as it is not needed at present.

SOPIA, Nov. 23

After a stiff battle on Sunday afternoon the Servians were driven out of Dragoman Pass by the Bulgarians, who thus occupied the Pass.

BERGRADE, Nov. 23.

Diversions by a force of 5,000 Servians in the direction of Sofia, aided to win the victory yesterday.

Thirty carriages, containing about 1,200 wounded soldiers, arrived here yesterday. The Queen's sister, Princess Glhiva personally attended the sufferers and gave them refreshments and tobacco.

A large number of ladies assisted her in the work.

Every building in the city is crowded with wounded soldiers.

Bulgarian prisoners who have been brought here state that many Russians and Englishmen are serving as officers or privates in the Bulgarian army. Many more wounded private soldiers are expected to arrive here soon.

There are 8,000 wounded men at Piro.

What the Grit Leaders Would Snoop to.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.

The appearance in Montreal of Mr. Edgar, Mr. Blake's factotum, and his conference with the Rouge leaders, indicate that the Ontario Grits are willing to do anything if they can defeat the Government. Much indignation is expressed among the Ontario Government's rank and file over Edgar's and Blake's attempt to give their sympathies to those in Quebec province who are flaming against the execution of Riel. It is safe to say that the feeling is no strong against the Grit leaders throughout Ontario, that if a general election took place the Government would win eighty-six seats.

The Watertown Murderer Confesses.

BOSTON, Nov. 23.

Information has been received here this morning that Feaser Cunliff had been arrested in New York, and sentenced to six years in State prison for burglary, and that he had made a confession of the murder of Mrs. Carleton at Watertown, in which he implicated the husband of the murdered woman. Cunliff is a colored man.

A Libel Suit.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The trial of an action for libel, brought by Mrs. Meldon against Sir Henry Booth, was concluded to-day. Damages to the amount of £1,000 and cost being rendered in her behalf.

Inciting to Arms.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 23.

M. Martin, editor of the Provincial newspaper, has been sentenced to four months' imprisonment on a charge of inciting the people to take up arms and drive obnoxious Estrupp from power.

WHALE ASHORE.—The Baddeck, C. B. Reporter is informed that the whale which came ashore near Tignish during the storm on the 6th day, was discovered by a boy named McTernan, who sold him to Mr. S. M. Myrick. The huge fish came ashore at Sea Cow Pond, and was buried in the sand to the depth of four feet. It measured 70 feet in length, 9 feet through, and the tail from tip to tip was 15 feet. It is now being cut up for oil. We hear that it is worth about \$500.
