

# Football Player's Death Blamed on Stimulants

MONTREAL (CP) — The death of Robert (Bob) McArdle, a husky 22-year-old football player, 24 hours after he collapsed on the football field, being played in 90-degree heat, was attributed Tuesday to over-exertion caused by stimulants.

"We don't really understand exactly what happened," said Rosario Fontaine, chief medico-legal expert for the province, who performed an autopsy. "He was a fine athletic specimen, had a good heart and was strong."

admitted to hospital Sunday, McArdle had a temperature of 102 degrees. The autopsy showed also that shock and a collapsed kidney caused over-exertion had contributed to the death. But it left unsolved the type of stimulant McArdle had used to bring on his death.
