

Premier To Make Public Announcement

Premier Campbell anticipates a public announcement within a few days, on what the future is to be for the Georgetown Industries.

Future operations of the steel trawler building program and seafood processing plant was discussed yesterday when Jens Moe and two groups of Norwegian interests in the venture met here with Premier Alex Campbell and members of the Provincial Cabinet.

A public announcement was made in late October regarding the financing and operation of the Georgetown Industries. It was announced that Bathurst Marine Ltd. had been paid \$670,000 for trawler building work that had not been actually carried out, and that Bathurst and Gulf Garden face some \$650,000 in current accounts payable that could not be met with the financial resources available.

The P.E.I. Government is committed to some \$9,000,000 in the Georgetown venture.

The Premier previously announced that every effort would be made to continue the building of trawlers and the development of fisheries, for steady production at the Gulf Garden Seafood plant. It has been further suggested that operations will be taken over by the Provincial Government, through a government department, agency or Crown corporation, if some arrangement cannot be made for a continuation under some form of private enterprise management.

Jens Moe, the prime organizer of the twin Georgetown enterprises requested an audience with the provincial cabinet to discuss the situation of the Georgetown Industries, but did not appear on two occasions after appointments had been arranged.

On Saturday night, October 29, a meeting was held with the cabinet on the question of the continuation of the enterprises following informal talks, Mr. Campbell had with some of the Norwegian principals in Ottawa, while the Premier was attending a Liberal Convention there.

Earlier this week, General Manager Gredal, Legal Counsel Tondre of Norinvest, the Oslo investment banking firm, and Reidar Korge, a Bergen shipbuilder, flew from Oslo to Montreal. Tuesday he chartered a plane to Charlottetown. Wednesday the trip was in conference with Fisheries and Industries Minister Cecil Miller.

Provincial Treasurer Mario Hickey, Deputy Fisheries Minister Gene Gorman, Fishermen's Loan Board Chairman Glen Baisley and Counsel Frank Sigsworth. A personal visit to the Georgetown plant was made by the Norwegians prior to the conference.

LATE ARRIVAL Late Wednesday afternoon, it is reported, Jens Moe accompanied by Odd Kappesstead of Oslo, an industrial and financial associate of Mr. Moe, flew into Charlottetown from Montreal. The pair are understood to have had a lengthy meeting with the Norinvest group at the Charlottetown Hotel Wednesday evening.

FIRST TRAWLER LAUNCHED The first of nine steel trawlers to be built in the program was launched at the Bathurst ways in Georgetown last weekend. The cost was reported at \$671,000 of which the Bathurst builders are required to put up a down payment of \$43,250, the Provincial Government \$391,950 and the Federal Government by subsidy, \$435,000.

ASK FRENCH HELP

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Soviet Deputy Premier Nikolai Baibakov, chairman of the state planning commission, Friday asked France to help the Soviet Union develop its mining and other industries. He said at a meeting with French Finance Minister Michael Debre that mining, raw material processing, and light industries are spheres in which the two countries can cooperate under agreement signed here in July.

Call Special Session Of Legislature Wednesday

The new federal-provincial tax agreement arrived at during the recent financial conference in Ottawa, and the consequent reaching of a basis for the provinces share of the federally collected income tax will be of primary importance, when the special session of the legislature is held next Wednesday.

No indication has been given by the government of any intention of raising the income tax, but it is known other matters due for discussion at the session will involve the finding of additional monies.

Among them will be the provision of free school books for children and the \$25 a month provincial increase in the Old Age Pension. Funds to pay for both will have to be voted by the Legislature.

Whether the Legislature will be required to deal with matters arising as a result of recent meetings between the Premier and cabinet members and financial interests involved in the

two Georgetown industries is not known, but with the financial situation said to be serious it is likely questions may be asked in the House.

EXTRA MEMBER Another matter scheduled for legislative action is a change permitting the addition of another member of the Executive Council to raise the total to 10 from the nine now legally permitted. This is being done to allow for inclusion of the new portfolio of labor now held by Hon. Elmer Blanchard.

Recently the attorney general in the former Conservative administration, M.A. Farmer, said in a telecast there was doubt of the legality of the present Executive Council since 10 men were now sitting on it after being sworn in by the Lieutenant Governor. This was denied by Premier Campbell who stated only nine were sworn. However, in rebuttal, Mr. Farmer has pointed to use of the title 'Honourable' as applied to Robert Campbell, minister without portfolio, and added orders-in-council consistently state that 10 were present at meetings of the Executive Council. He also said pictures showed 10 at the Council board.

Special sittings of the Legislature are not routine, nor are they rare, but they seldom last more than a couple of days. However, the subjects to be reviewed this time may spark

long debates although as yet the Opposition, led by former Premier Walter R. Shaw, has given no indication of the policy it will follow.

Centennial Stamp On Sale In January

A special long-term five-cent commemorative stamp to mark Canada's one hundredth year as a nation will be a bright production in colors of red, white and blue. Postmaster General Jean-Pierre Cole announced today. The scheduled date of release is 15th January, 1967.

Designed by Brigdens Limited, Toronto, the new stamp is large in size and vertical in format. It depicts a globe on which is emphasized in bold blue Canada's area on the North American Continent; matching in colour is the official Centennial Centennial symbol with the

years 1867-1967 at the lower right. Superimposed on the upper area is the red and white national flag.

In keeping with the significance of the event, the new issue will remain on sale throughout the year, Mr. Cole stated. In this way it will differ from most commemorative stamps in Canada, which are normally produced in numbers sufficient for an estimated 10 days' sale.

The Centennial stamp will employ a virtually invisible adhesive which was successfully tested on the 1966 Highway Safety Stamp. A percentage of the issue will be overprinted with a special coating necessary to activate mail handling equipment in the Winnipeg area. Printing is by the steel line intaglio process from an engraving by the Canadian Bank Note Company, Ottawa. Production will be continued as required throughout the year.

SHIPS COLLIDE, 7 MISSING - ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) - Seven fishermen are missing and presumed dead after the Romanian tanker Ploesti sliced through a Turkish fishing boat in the Bosphorus Straits, port authorities reported Friday. The collision cut the 14-ton fishing boat Bereket in two, and only three of her 10-man crew were rescued.
