## Armed Forces Vacancies Filled By Announcement

OTTAWA (CP)—Gaps left in the hierarchy of the Canadian armed forces by the firing of one admiral and the resignation of another were filled Friday with the announcement of a batch of promotions by the defence department.

Capt. Richard Leir, 44, of Penitton, B.C., now commander of the 1st Canadian Escort Squadron based at Halifax, has been promoted to commodore and appointed senior Canadian naval officer afloat, Atlantic.

He succeeds Rear-Admiral J. C. O'Brien, who recently took over as head of Atlantic Command, succeeding Rear-Admiral William Landymore, who was fired.

Capt. Harry A. Porter, 45, of Chermains, B.C., now commanding officer of the aircraft carrier Bonaventure, also has been elevated to commodore and appointed director-general of Maritime forces at Ottawa.

He takes over from Commodore J. A. Charles, who is to become deputy commander of the Pacific Fleet.

Admiral Charles in turn succeeded Rear-Admiral M. G. Stirling who was asked to be relieved because he disagreed with the government's unification policy.

**WAS CADET BOSS**  
Capt. Leir's most recent appointment has been commander of the destroyer escorts Crusader and Skeena, executive officer of the Bonaventure and commander of the cadet training establishment HMCS Ventura.

Capt. Porter in recent years has commanded the 4th Canadian Escort Squadron and been director of naval training.

Other senior appointments: Brig. A. James Tedlie, 50, of Montreal, now commander of the 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group stationed in Germany, will become deputy commander for training at Training Command headquarters in Winnipeg. He takes over from Brig. A. J. B. Bailey, whose new appointment is to be announced later.

Brig. E. A. C. Amy, 48, of Kentville, N.S., now commander of the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade Group at Calgary, is to succeed Brig. Tedlie.

Taking over Brig. Amy's post at Calgary will be Col. Stanley C. Waters, 46, of Winnipeg, Col. Waters, who will be promoted brigadier, now is director of training at Canadian Forces Headquarters.

Brig. Jacques Dextraze, 46, of Montreal, now commander of the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade Group, will be appointed chief of staff for operations and training at Mobile Command headquarters in Montreal. He takes over from Brig. M. R. Dare whose promotion to major-general and new posting as deputy chief of reserves was announced earlier.

**TO TAKE COMMAND**  
Col. Edward M. D. Leslie, 47, of Ottawa, is to be promoted brigadier and will command the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade Group, succeeding Brig. Dextraze.

Brig. William A. Milroy, 46, of Brownlee, Sask., now commander of the 3rd Canadian Infantry Brigade Group at Camp Gagetown, N.B., is to become commander of the Canadian Army Staff College in Kingston. He succeeds Brig. Bruce F. Macdonald, whose appointment as deputy chief of personnel was announced recently.

Col. Bernard J. Guimond, 45, of Quebec City, will succeed Brig. Milroy at Camp Gagetown. Now a military attaché in France, he also will be promoted brigadier.

Commodore E. N. Clarke, 52, of Vancouver, commander of the naval dockyard in Halifax, is to be appointed chief of staff at Materiel Command headquarters in Ottawa. He succeeds Commodore Donald McClure whose promotion to rear-admiral and appointment as deputy commander, administration, at Mobile Command was previously announced.

Capt. Robert Stephens, 42, of Esquimalt, B.C., will be promoted commodore and take over Commodore Clark's position at Halifax. Capt. Stephens now is manager of ship repairs at Halifax.

### Students Here For Tour Sunday

A group of high school students from various northern Alberta points will arrive in Charlottetown Sunday on an extended tour across Canada.

This year's tour is intended to be an adventure in Canadian citizenship. All students participating are fluent in both French and English and are being received by youth and adult groups in the prairie provinces as well as in Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes.

They were chosen on a basis of academic excellence, personality, and participation in school and community activities. All grade 11 and 12 students from the bilingual schools of Alberta were eligible.

The group includes 17 girls and 13 boys, accompanied by four adult supervisors. Traveling by bus, the group will be met in Charlottetown by a group of city students. Also included on the one-day program will be a dinner, social evening and tour of the city. The students will be billeted at PWC during their stay. They will leave for Bathurst, N.B., on the morning of July 25.

Cosponsored by the Canadian Centennial Commission, the group is under the auspices of the Alberta Bilingual Teachers' Association, and the French-Canadian Association of Alberta.
