

A Remarkable Elopement and its Singular Denouement.

Upper Province journals furnish details of an elopement which last week created quite a sensation in the Dominion capital. Yesterday week two young girls, fourteen years old of respectable Ottawa families, obtained their parents consent to attend a picnic. They did not return as expected. Enquiry brought to light the fact that a boy some sixteen years old had started on the same excursion, and also had not returned. Another boy of like age wanted to attend the same picnic, but had been prevented by his mother, who on his persisting in a professed determination to go, had summarily locked him up. Probably this youth, as the day waned, let the fact leak out that the proper name of the so-called picnic was elopement. However, it was known on Tuesday night that the two young girls and the one boy had departed per railway in company for distant parts. The following morning, the father of one of the girls took the road in pursuit. Arriving at Ogdensburg, he found traces of the runaways, the conductor having noticed them on the train the previous day, seemingly on account of their spongy manifestations. On the arrival of the train at Utica at 10.30 p. m., the conductor beheld the adventurous youth on the platform, and tried to capture him but failed. The pursuing parent made his way to an hotel, and the youth dogged him thither to learn who the pursuers were. He was noticed, and traced to a boarding house, whether the aggrieved and angry parent hastened, and there found all three elopers. The youth whose name is Wilnot, passed as Master Gordon and his beloved as his sister Miss Gordon, and her female companion as Miss Kingsford—all from Quebec. The girls astonished, frightened, but glad, for they had begun to realize their folly, received a solemn lecture; but for Master Wilnot treatment of a rather more drastic character was in store. He was not considered worthy of a good horsewhipping, so the irate parent turned the boy over his knee and administered an old-time spanking in a highly satisfactory manner. On the following day the girls were borne back to their homes somewhat sadder but a good deal wiser. It was reported that a goodnatureed Yankee magistrate had married Master Wilnot to the choice of his heart. But that does not appear to be true. The boy had \$80 when he started, his own money, and had when found at Utica obtained a situation. The girls were enquiring for employment at the shops. No doubt it would be found on enquiry that the silly creatures have been diligent readers of dime novel literature, and fancied that in eloping as they did, they were acting in the most romantic fashion.
