

# Wheat Export Decline Seen Likely In Canada

WASHINGTON (CP) — The United States Tuesday predicted that U. S. and Canadian wheat exports will decline in the current crop year mainly because of larger European supplies.

At the same time it forecast continuing Canadian wheat exports for 1959, providing strong domestic markets for food although in some cases U. S. retail prices may dip because of healthy domestic production.

The U. S. agriculture department, in making these predictions at the annual farm outlook conference, disclosed that Canada moved up to the second spot among leading buyers of U. S. agricultural products.

Though a big food producer, Canada replaced Japan in the No. 2 spot, buying a total \$354,000,000 worth of U. S. agricultural products in the 12 months ended last June 30.

Britain, the leading customer, took \$400,000,000 worth. Canada's imports from her neighbor are mainly fruits, vegetables, vegetable oils and cotton.

Looking over the wheat situation, the department estimated U. S. exports will dip by some \$30,000,000 bushels to about 415,000,000 in the crop year ending next June 30. Canadian exports are predicted to fall by 15,000,000 or 20,000,000 bushels from last year's 300,000,000. The U. S. and Canadian crop years differ with the U. S. ending June 30 and Canada's July 31.

Among dominant features of last year's world trade was a rise in Russian exports, the department said. This rise in Soviet exports filled a gap caused by a decline in French shipments.

Imports of Soviet wheat into non-Communist countries reached over 60,000,000 bushels compared to only about 15,000,000 in 1957-58. As a result, Soviet wheat filled the gap left by the short supply of French wheat.
