Another great harness racing attraction goes tonight at Charlottetown Driving Park.

It's another nine dash program that's loaded with action from start to finish. The job of picking winners tonight should indeed be a most difficult chore.

Dashes four and eight find seven good pacers ready to fight it out for supremacy. Clark Smith takes Don MacDonald's Real Gold away on the rail and that advantage will make this pacer hard to head to the finish wire.

Others in these dashes — and all with every license to win — are Highland Rogue, Port Hill Boy, Lola Hal, Abern C, Miss Heather Hal and Jolly Dick.

Island Track Team Stars At Atlantic Competition

Members of the Islander track and field club made a very strong showing at the first annual Atlantic Provinces Invitational Track and field meet held in Moncton Saturday when they took the unofficial high aggregate for the clubs entered in the competition with a point total "in excess of 200".

Three members of the club, Jane Johnston of Charlottetown, Gordie Bell of Charlottetown and Chris Annett were awarded trophies for having garnered the most points in their classes.

Jane Johnston, competing in the Bantam girls category proved a master of all facets of the sport as she topped first in the high jump, broad jump, shot, discus, and javelin while taking runner-up honors in the sixty and 100 yard dashes. She was awarded the trophy for having the highest point total in her class, a total of thirty one.

Another bantam, Gordon Bell put on a glittering performance in his class, showing both speed and strength. He sprinted to wins in the 100 (10.8) 220 and 440 yard dashes while taking the winners prize in both the shot and discus. Bell also placed third in both the triple jump and discus throw. He too received a city of Moncton trophy for taking high aggregate honors in his class.

Third trophy winner was Chris Annett who competed in the junior mens class. Annett topped first in the High Jump, broad jump and javelin throw while taking a second and third place finish in the shot and discus respectively.

Prince Edward Island 100 yard dash record holder Billy MacKinnon, competing in the Juvenile class turned in a fine performance in the sprints as he showed his heels to the field in the 100 and 220. Despite a relatively slow track MacKinnon posted a sterling time of 10.3 in the 100. He also led the relay team to a triumph in the 440 yard juvenile relay.

Two other well known local track stars also came through with excellent marks in the meet. Andrew Arsenault, half miler Jeltux, won his speciality along with a first in the mile and a second in the 440. A mere 6' separated Arsenault from his first place of the day.

Veteran weight specialist, Bob Simmonds of Charlottetown showed his class in taking the Discus and javelin events in the mens open category. He placed second to another Island competitor Bob Smith of the RCAF Base in the shot and took yet another second in the hammer throw, an event which he does

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Jack Nicklaus Takes Tourney

WHITEMARSH, Pa. (AP) — Jack Nicklaus rammed home a 45-foot eagle putt on the 17th hole Sunday to break a four-way tie and win the \$125,000 Philadelphia golf classic for the second straight year.

Nicklaus won by one stroke with an 11-under-par 72-hole total of 277.

The 25-year-old Masters champion hit his drive into the woods behind some trees off the 17th tee. But he hit the next shot onto the green, past the cup to the fringe about 45 feet away.

He stroked the ball into the hole for an eagle on the 55-yard, par five hole and finished with a 68 over the par 72 White-marsh Valley Country Club course.

The 17th was the same hole on which Nicklaus scored an eagle last year to edge Gary Player by one stroke.

Nicklaus, Doug Sanders, Randy Glover and Joe Campbell had been deadlocked at nine under par through 70 holes.

Sanders and Campbell finished in a second-place tie, each with 72-hole totals of 278. Randy Glover was fourth with 280.

Tony Lema faded on the final nine holes with three one-over-par holes. Dick Sikes, the rookie from Arkansas who led the first two rounds, also fell by the wayside with a 282.

In winning his fourth tournament this year, Nicklaus earned \$24,300, boosting his pro tour money winnings for 1965 to \$114,000, only \$14,230 short of Arnold Palmer's all-time single season winning record of \$128,230.

Paul MacLean Wins P.E.I. Open

Halifax's Paul MacLean displayed some of the finest tennis played in recent years at the city courts as he won the P.E.I. Open tennis Championships by ousting five competitors without dropping a set.

MacLean, an excellent backhand along with a strong net downed Bob Bret of Summerside 6-3, 6-1 in the first match and never looked back.

In his second match MacLean downed 15 year old Mike Duffy of Charlottetown 6-2, 6-0. MacLean was very impressed with this youngster's ability.

After Duffy, MacLean eliminated J. J. Cruickshank of Halifax by score of 6-4, 6-4. This was one of the best matches of the day with both giving an excellent performance.

In the semi-finals MacLean defeated Walter Ylo of New Jersey 6-2, 6-1. This was also an excellent match of tennis with every point being closely contested.

In the final match MacLean downed fellow Haligonian Pete Aucoin in a hard fought battle for the title.

Aucoin downed J. MacQuaid, Charlottetown, C. Darby, Summerside, B. Gray, Charlottetown and D. Gray, Halifax before bowing out to MacLean.

Excellent tennis was displayed during the three day tournament and although mainland players took home the trophies some of the Island players showed fine skill with veterans Bud McElear and Doug George leading the way.

MacElear who plays a great placing game just missed the semi-finals. MacElear downed Barry Turner of Charlottetown 6-0, 6-1 and disposed of Bob Watson of Halifax 6-4, 6-6 and 7-5.

Ylo then eliminated Schaefer 2-6, 6-3, 6-1 in a well played match, with both displaying fine shots along with excellent strategy. Ylo also eliminated Power of Dartmouth 7-5 and 6-0 and Huggan of Charlottetown 7-9, 6-2, 6-2.

Power showed his greatest skill in teaming up with Schaefer to reach the semi-finals in the mens doubles. They first disposed of Darby and Campbell of Summerside 6-3, 6-2, then dropped the city team of George and MacElear 6-3, 4-6, 6-4 before losing to Aucoin and Gray, also of Halifax 6-3, 7-5.

The doubles finals will be played in Halifax with Aucoin and Gray playing against MacLean and Watson.

All in all this tournament was a huge success and is an excellent start in getting tennis back on its feet.

The total entry was \$5 with 20 from Charlottetown, six from Halifax, seven from Summerside, one from Dartmouth and one from New Jersey.

Older players from the city such as Herb Hughes, Paul Kays, Doug George and Bud McElear contributed greatly to the promotion of the game by their participation in the tournament. These stars of former years are a great assistance to the younger players and show that good strategy and old legs can still make fairly good tennis players.

Much appreciation should also be given to Dave Boswell and to the Department of Physical Education for their providence of balls and trophies.

Tom Rolfe Wins Again

NEW YORK (CP) — Wheeling into the lead at the stretch turn, Tom Rolfe scored an easy four-length victory over Gummo in the \$100,000 Chicago Stakes at Arlington Park in Chicago Saturday.

It was the third stakes victory of the season for the Potomac color bearer, who earlier won the Preakness and the \$50,000 added Citation at Arlington Park.

The triumph was Tom Rolfe's seventh in 10 starts this season. He won \$65,000 to boost his earnings for two years to \$372,605, and took a giant stride towards the three-year-old championships.

Buckpasser, a stretch-running son of the great Tom Fool, turned on the power in the last one-eighth of a mile Saturday and won the \$112,185 Sapling Stakes at Monmouth Park in Oceanport, N.J.

The favored Our Michael finished third in the field of seven two-year-olds.

At Saratoga Springs, N.Y., mighty Kelso, flashing his former winning form, stormed from behind in the stretch Saturday to win the Whitney Stakes by a nose and again barge into contention for an incredible sixth straight horse-of-the-year title.

Giants 1 Game Off Pace; Reds Claw Dodgers 18-0

San Francisco Giants, winning their sixth straight as Warren Spahn snapped a nine-game losing streak, climbed to within one game of the National League lead by defeating the Cardinals 6-4 in St. Louis Sunday.

The winning margin came on Willie McCovey's 26th home run in the fifth inning and Willie Mays' 30th in the sixth. Jesus Alou also homered for the Giants in the first. Mays' homer was his fifth in the last four games.

Spahn, lifted in the sixth inning, kicked a sixth-place tie with Kid Nichols on the pitchers' all-time winning list by scoring his 361st victory and his first since May 22. He has a 5-13 record this season.

At Cincinnati Jim Maloney pitched a four-hitter and Leo Cardenas paced a 20-hit attack with three hits and four runs batted in as Cincinnati trounced the National League — leading Dodgers 18-0.

LASTED FOR TWO
Don Drysdale started for the Dodgers but lasted only two innings, giving up six runs and losing his 10th game against 15 victories.

Jim Perry pitched no-hit ball for 6 2/3 innings but had to settle for a two-hitter as the American League-leading Minnesota Twins whipped Boston 8-0 for their fifth straight victory.

The game in Minneapolis saw Don Mincher drive in three Minnesota runs with a single and triple and Tony Oliva collect four hits, including a two-run double in the eighth.

Joe Peptide singled in a run with two out in the ninth inning, giving New York Yankees a 6-5 triumph over the Tigers in American League action at Detroit.

The victory moved the Yankees to within one game of the 500 mark, a level they haven't reached since May 1.

Jim King and Mike Brumley each hit two-run singles as Washington rallied for five runs in the eighth-inning and defeated the Angels 6-4 in American League action at Los Angeles.

WON IN EIGHTH
The Senators, trailing 4-1, won in the eighth after a walk to pinch hitter Doug Camilli plus singles by Willie Kirkland and Dick Nen loaded the bases with none out and finished Angel Starter Fred Newman.

At Chicago Chico Salmon's double with one out in the seventh inning triggered a five-run rally that carrier Cleveland Indians past the White Sox 6-4 in the first game of an American League doubleheader.

The second game was postponed because of rain.

Hamilton's 2 Late Scores Lead To Victory Over Als

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats launched their 1965 Eastern Football Conference campaign Saturday night with an 18-9 victory over Montreal Alouettes, but they scored two touchdowns in the final five minutes to do it.

The defending league champions, contained most of the night by a hard-hitting and hard-charging Montreal front wall, found the range in the dying moments with two quick scoring thrusts.

The decision nullified a brilliant performance by Bernie Falone, the Ticat discard who went to the Als in an eight-player trade earlier this year.

The underdog Als, with Faloney, a 19-year Ticat, directing traffic from the quarterback slot and halfback George Dixon carrying most of the offensive, were ahead 9-5 before Tiger-Cats made their big moves. The Als had built up a 9-3 first-quarter lead and held Ticats to a single point in each of the second and third quarters.

WRAPPED UP WIN
Then, with unexpected suddenness and with the clock ticking away the minutes and a slim civic stadium crowd of 21,735 ready to head for the exits, Tiger-Cats powered to a game-winning touchdown that wrapped up the game. That came at 11:38 and then, with 15 seconds remaining, they scored their clincher.

Coach Ralph Szabo of Ticats started with import Joe Zuger at quarter. He couldn't move the club and homebrew Frank Cosentino took over in the second quarter.

The 27-year-old Cosentino, who appeared shaky at times and who was smeared for big losses, moved Ticats 76 yards in 10 plays for their first touchdown. That came on a six-yard end zone pass to Stan Crisson. They wrapped things up nicely three minutes later when Johnny Counts dashed over the Montreal line on 11 yards out.
