

Centennial Building Draws Praise Of Chief

HALIFAX (CP)—Dr. Norman Archibald MacKenzie hasn't organized a birthday party for about 15 years but he's planning a big one now.

One of the last parties he organized was for the youngest of his children. The next will be for Canada.

But unlike the earlier parties, held in a small room but in Vancouver where he lived with his wife and three children during his first years as president of the University of British Columbia, this one will be celebrated coast to coast as Canadians mark their country's 100th birthday in 1967.

The big job fell into his arms last month when he was named chairman of the Canadian Cen-

tenary Council. He retired in Vancouver earlier this year after 18 years as UBC president.

DIRECTS PLANNING
The council, which he described in an interview here Tuesday as "a sort of clearing house," was set up in 1960 to plan for private and corporate centennial planning. It consists of more than 225 member organizations.

The chairmanship, a voluntary, non-paying job, was left vacant when C. M. Drury of Montreal was elected a member of Parliament in the June federal election.

Dr. MacKenzie was in Halifax to attend a Bank of Nova Scotia directors' meeting.

At 68, the broad-shouldered six-foot Pugwash, N.S., native brings to the council a distinguished career in education and experience gained from service on numerous boards and commissions, including the Massey royal commission of arts, letters and sciences.

"One of the most important duties of the council should be to focus attention on Canadian history," he said.

PRaises CENTRE
He termed Charlottetown's Arts and Cultural Centre now under construction "both imaginative and exciting" and a good example of the lasting nature of projects encouraged by the council.

The Charlottetown centre is being built in observance of the city's centennial celebrations in 1964. It was in Charlottetown that the blueprint for Confederation was drawn in 1864.

So far the council has held two annual meetings.

A third is set for next March in Montreal.

Time is the biggest problem. "We're hoping to hear soon from some sort of agency to give direction to the overall organization . . . time is running out."

Prince County Co-op Housing Group Formed

Between seven and 10 families in the Wellington-Egmont area plan to form a co-operative housing group, and expect to begin construction of homes in the spring, provincial housing commission chairman Reid Sangster said yesterday morning.

Mr. Sangster and commission administrator William Meggison met with the group Tuesday night to explain co-operative housing methods. Also at the meeting were the village commissioners of Wellington, who promised their co-operation in any group housing projects, and members of the Roman Catholic clergy.

Since the co-operative housing scheme began in the province a few years ago, 103 homes have been started many of which have been completed. Areas in which there are projects are Charlottetown, Summerside, Borden, O'Leary, Souris and Burnaby. A project may begin in Morell in the spring.

Mr. Sangster said Wednesday morning that the commission will consider the feasibility of row housing, a cheaper method of home building than the individual homes. "We must try a project of this type," he said, "if we can get an interested group, possibly in the Charlottetown area."

The commission plans to meet tonight to discuss its future building program.

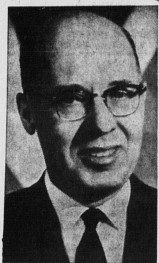

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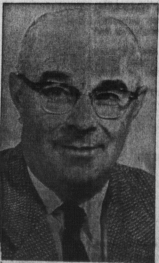
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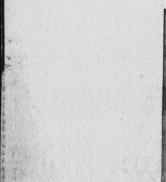
