THE 49ERS.—To-day is the thirtieth anniversary of the sailing of the brig "Fanny" from this port for California. The "Fanny" took forty passengers, and made the passage around the Horn in seven months.

MR. MORGAN BROWN, an Englishman, has invented a machine that will fire 300 shots a minute, and they will pierce an iron-plated vessel at a distance of 1,000 yards. The French Government have ordered 500 of the machines.

A NEW JERSEY boy on the man-of-war St. Mary, in writing home, says:—"There are three things a boy wants as soon as he gets to sea—first, to get home; second, a good square meal; and third, to get his fingers on the fellow who wrote 'Jack Harkaw,' that being the name of a book which gives a glowing description of life at sea.

DIPHTHERIA is now very prevalent among children in the city. The City School Board has requested the doctors not to allow parents send their children to the City Schools while there is any contagious disease existing in their family. As a result of this request, the attendance at the West Kent Street school has greatly diminished. We are informed that since the opening of that school eighteen of pupils died of diphtheria.

RECENT English mails reports the death of Bishop Russel, of North China, for thirty-one years a missionary at Ningpo and for seven years a missionary Bishop. His literary work was important. As a missionary he brought about several hundred conversions, and as a Bishop he ordained four Chinese clergymen, besides building several mission churches and confirming three hundred Chinese Christians.

MOST diabolical outrages are reported by the North Sydney Herald. It states that last spring a horse's throat was cut from side to side in his owner's barn at West Bay; subsequently, in the same locality, a cow was shot dead in the neighborhood, two cows were found frightfully gashed and mangled with an axe, one dead. Many outrages of a minor character have lately been perpetrated in the same district, and it is probable that it is the work of one or two human fiends.

NOTICE is hereby given that copies of the Assessment Lists for the year 1879, have been furnished to the undermentioned Collectors, who are empowered to receive all Assessment or Taxes payable to them by the ratepayers of their several Districts, until the 30th day of November next, at the residences or the offices of the respective Collectors, in accordance with the provisions of the Assessment Act, 1877, and the Act in amendment thereto, after which time every Collector will proceed to demand and collect the rates and taxes from all those rate-payers who shall not have paid the same.
