A RAILWAY IN THE HOLY LAND.—The Constantinople At-Jawab of the 14th ult., says:—“We are assured that a mixed company have obtained a concession for laying down a railway between Jaffa and Jerusalem, also to construct a harbor for shipping at the former place. Gen. Mott, of the United States army, and a member of the Red Cross Society, is the representative of the company here. He sailed last Friday for Paris to consult with the company with regard to putting the concession into immediate execution.” The same journal states that several plans for railroads in Asia Minor have been submitted to the Porte, but that thus far nothing in that respect has been officially decided.

THE RESULT.

Tremendous Majorities!

(Special Despatch to Examiner.) MONTREAL, Sept. 18.

The Conservative majority in Ontario is 22. In Quebec the Conservatives have a majority of 20.

Cartwright and Blake are among the defeated.

The Conservative majority in Montreal West was 1,600; in Montreal East, 1,500; in Montreal Centre, 800.

Ottawa, London and Hamilton all returned Conservatives.

We will have at least 45 of a majority in the next Parliament.

SACKVILLE, Sept. 19.

Election returns show McDonnell (Government) re-elected in Inverness. Minister Laflamme is elected in Jacques Cartier by 14 majority. It was Laflamme (Liberal) of Dundas who was defeated. In Waterloo South, Merner (Opposition) is elected by 50 majority. Gillies (Opposition) is elected in North Bruce by 152. Orton (Opposition) is elected in Wellington Centre; also Drew (Opposition) in North Wellington by 68. Sproule's majority in East Grey is 500; and South Simcoe returns Little (Opposition) by 172. Gillmore (Grit) is elected in Charlotte by 233 majority.

FOUR Cabinet ministers, Coffin, Blake, Cartwright and Jones have been defeated. But the great Grit "wave" still rears its horrid crest, &c.

SEVEN of the seats carried by the Grits in New Brunswick will be contested, and there are grounds for belief that several of the members elected will be disqualified.

THOS. WHITE, Jr., of the Montreal Gazette, who went to Cardwell only a week ago, has been elected. We congratulate Mr. White on his success. The editor of the Mail is also elected.

WE regret to learn that the barn of Mr. David Mutch, of Rustico, was consumed by fire on Wednesday evening. It contained a large quantity of grain and all Mr. Mutch's farming implements.

MR. TON TON TERHUKUM delivered a racy lecture on "The Indian," on Market Square, last evening, to a very large audience of men, women and children. MASSACHUSETTS vital statistics show that more people died in that State last year from consumption than from any other cause. Diphtheria was second on the list. Scarlatina, in previous years very fatal, fell to the fourteenth place. Dysentery was unusually severe, but the other diseases were not far out of their accustomed relation. In infancy the diarrheal diseases of summer surpassed all other causes of death. It is alluded to as an interesting fact that old age is assigned as a cause of so many deaths, outranking the fatality of more controllable conditions; this feature is especially noteworthy in the rural Counties of Barnstable, Berkshire, Franklin, Hampshire, Norfolk and Plymouth. Four per cent. of the deaths during that year were from violent causes, and of the total number 21 boys and 3 girls were drowned.

THE MONCTON POISONING CASE.—At the examination of Mrs. Isabel Burke, on Tuesday afternoon, arrested for an attempt to poison her husband, Lorang Burke, on the 26th Aug. last, Burke gave evidence to the effect that he had sat down to dinner prepared by his wife, and on taking a mouthful of stewed blueberries they tasted like hot ashes, and went to his throat and head. He immediately vomited out the berries, and suspected that an attempt had been made to poison him. Dr. Scott gave evidence of making an analysis of the berries left with him by the Frenchman, and finding evidences of vitrol in large quantities in them. The examination was concluded on the 18th before Justice Wortman, and the woman committed for trial in the Supreme Court.
