He said the West's plan of elections first was unacceptable and "undemocratic" because it proposed reunification by the four occupying powers instead of by the Germans themselves.
Replying to Western arguments that the Communist East German regime is not a representative government, Molotov said there are many nations where it is impossible to represent national and state life without the participation of Communists in the government.
Limited Function
Molotov argued that a provisional government would have a limited function with its main task to conduct elections as soon as possible.
"As a result of this, an all-German National Assembly could meet this year and work out a new German constitution as well as form a competent all-German government," he said.
Molotov's announcement of his plan for European security came at the end of Tuesday's four-man session during a discussion on the business for the rest of this week.
Returning to his attack on the Delors sessions of the European Community, Molotov said it only embraced six nations. He said European security is a wider problem than that of the six states alone.
"We consider it wrong for a United Germany to be included in any military bloc with East European countries against West Germany," he said. "Similarly, we consider it wrong for a United Germany to join any military bloc of Western powers directed against East Germany."

the French Parliament, the chamber of Deputies gave him two rounds of applause. Premier Joseph Laniel in an address of welcome referred to Canada as a country "occupying a privileged place in our heart."
In his broadcast address to the French people - originally scheduled for Monday but postponed for 24 hours - the Canadian leader said that although old historical friendships had lost none of their vigour, they must now be placed in a larger sphere.
"if the friendship between Canada and France has lost none of its vigour... it is because your country, like mine, has known how to conserve... certain fundamental notions which - and we are aware of the test - constitute the unbreakable foundations of this friendship," he said.

Convictions Shared
"You in France believe in parliamentary democracy, in the possible equilibrium between the liberty of men and the liberty of states, between the rights of the individual and those of the community....
We share these convictions, and our system of government traced from the constitutional traditions of England is the armor which protects our political philosophy, and which permits its widest application."
Of NATO, he said that "for the first time in his history, Canada has signed in peacetime a mutual assistance pact which obliges her to take up arms if France or other powers of the Atlantic association are victims of aggression."
We believe sincerely in the value of this pact for the protection of peace.

CWAC Shortens Skirts, Wrens And WD's Differ

OTTAWA, (CP) - The Canadian Women's Army Corps doesn't come right out and say so in so many words but it strongly implies that the navy and air force girls are way behind the fashion times.
In fact, some CWACs say they think the Wrens and WD's look like "potato sacks" in those long skirts. Long that is, in comparison to CWAC skirts.
The CWAC recently shortened skirts an inch so that they now are 14 to 16 inches from the floor, depending on height of the girl.
The CWAC said Tuesday it wasn't following any Paris or New York fashion. It simply prefers shorter skirts for its 1,200 reservists because it thinks they make the uniform look smarter.
The Wrens and WD's say they aren't contemplating any change in the length of skirts. Standard for both services is 11 3/4 to 14 inches from the floor - in the case of the Wrens, from the deck. There now are 197 full-time Wrens, 628 in the reserve. There are 3,200 regular WD's and 700 reservists.

These same quotas are being continued in 1954. However, a number of items previously on the restricted list now can be shipped into the BWI market from any part of the world without restriction.
Normal Trade Items
Added to the classification of open general licence are: newspaper; kraft paper; dried smoked, pickled and salted fish; onions; potatoes; cheese; powdered and canned milk; split peas, ments; canned fish; and animal feeds in the case of all colonies with the exception of British Guiana.
All these are items which Canada normally sells to BWI. Last year they amounted to about \$10,000,000 of the \$40,000,000 worth of Canadian goods absorbed by the British colonies.
They are of particular interest to the east coast which has a long-established trade link with the BWI. It was the Barittines which suffered particularly when the colonies were forced to curb imports during the war and post-war years.
Trade officials now expect there will be a step-up in business with the BWI and Transport Minister Chevrier said the Canadian National Steamships will continue to operate 10 or 12 cargo ships on runs to the West Indies this year.

Urged Relaxation
Canada has urged relaxation of the BWI market in recent years on the grounds that the colonies, which include Jamaica, Honduras and Trinidad, had been earning a big surplus in Canadian trade.
However, Britain, which controls the colonies' purse-strings, had argued that a shortage of dollars in Britain's treasury made relaxation difficult.
The fact that Britain now has agreed to relaxation - at a time when Canada-BWI trade is more in balance - has given rise to hope among Ottawa officials that Britain may soon move toward convertibility, that is, to remove government curbs from the pound and make it freely exchangeable with the dollar.
Finance Minister Abbott, returning from a Commonwealth financial ministers' conference, said recently that convertibility is a lot closer than at any time since the Second World War.

Two Arrested For Theft Of Cars
OTTAWA, (CP) - Two men were arrested during the week-end after recovery by police of two automobiles, believed to be loot in a two-province car theft ring.
Napoleon Lecours, 36, of Masham, Que., and Rosaire Trinquet, 23, of St. Eugene, Que., were remanded here Monday charged with car theft.
Police said a Hull, Que., motorist, Diomed Savard, spotted his car, stolen early last month. It had been re-painted. The owner, Andre Gingras, also of Hull, told police he bought it from two men at Masham.
Police arrested Lecours and Trinquet at Masham where they found a workshop.
The second car recovered had been stolen in St. Hyacinthe, Que., Jan. 25 and was owned by Hector Dalpape, Pawtucket, R.I. (Vancouver East).

newspaper, fish and several other commodities to the British West Indies.
A statement by Fisheries Minister Sinclair that Britain will buy more Canadian salmon this year.
Report Untrue
There was little debate on the measure increasing parliamentary pay. The only speaker, Progress Conservative Leader Drew, said he regrets the government did not accept his request for an independent study of the question by a royal commission or select parliamentary committee.
Mr. Drew, however, denied what he described as a report in a periodical that he had indicated privately his support of the pay increase and had conferred with the government on the bill before it was introduced.
He did not name the periodical, but said both statements are "wholly untrue".
During the bill's passage through the House, C.O.P. members made two unsuccessful attempts to amend it by eliminating senators from the increase and by limiting the increase to \$2,000 instead of \$4,000. Also defeated was a Social Credit proposal designed to give members a chance to refuse part or all of the increase.
Penalty Increased
One change, however, was written into the bill. The penalty for absenteeism will become \$60 a day for every day a member is absent without excuse beyond 21 sitting days in a session. The penalty has been \$75.00 a day for absences beyond 15 days a session.
The Progressive Conservative party last week voted solidly against second reading - approval in principle - of the pay increase bill. Tuesday, however, four of the 49-member party voted to give it final reading. They were Rodney Adamson (York West); J. H. Ferguson (Simcoe North); Carl Nickle (Calgary South) and R. H. McGregor (York East).
Only four of seven C.O.P. members who last week voted in favor of the principle of increases still voted for final reading. They were Joseph W. Noseworthy (York South); Clarie Gillis (Cape Breton South); Thomas Barnett (Coxton); and Harold E. Winch (Alberta).

Russia Interested In Sending Track Team To The U.S.

MOSCOW, (AP) - Russia is interested in sending a track team to the United States this spring and have U.S. athletes visit the Soviet Union, a government official said Monday.
Dmitry Posenkov, deputy minister of health and chief of the central board of physical culture, also announced the Soviet Union would send its champion chess team to New York in June for a match with top U.S. players.
Posenkov added in an interview that the moves are part of an expanded program of international competition arranged for Soviet teams this year.
No specific track plans were announced. The official said he had asked for a schedule of events and these were being studied.
Posenkov told The Associated Press the Soviet Union has decided to invite football teams of Britain, France and Italy to play in Moscow this summer.

Plan Arctic Flight For R.A.F. Jet

OTTAWA, (CP) - First Arctic navigation flight by an RAF jet aircraft will be made this month by the Canberra "Aries IV" of the RAF flying college at Manby, Lincolnshire, the United Kingdom information office here said Tuesday.
The Aries will leave for Ottawa Feb. 16 and make a series of flights over or near the north magnetic pole to test high-altitude navigational techniques at the high speeds and heights of jet aircraft.
The Aries, to be captained by Wing Cdr. C. S. G. Stanbury, established records in December for the London-to-Cape Town and Capetown-to-London flights.
