Returns From Meeting Of Medical Ass'n

One of the most successful annual meetings ever held was reported by the Canadian Medical Association which recently concluded its gathering in Winnipeg with over 2,000 doctors and their wives present.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, of this city, took the attendance and was re-elected to the executive of the Association in years of service. Also present from this city were Dr. John Maloney and Dr. Temple Hooper. Reports indicated that over 9,000 doctors were paid up members of the Association.

Important Work A great deal of important work was done during the week-long session with much of the discussion centering around medical economics, nutrition, standardization and approval of hospitals and public relations. An international flavor attended the convention with the presence of Dr. Robert Forbes of the British Medical Association, Dr. John Hunter, Australian Medical Association; and Dr. George Lull, American Medical Association.

Receiving considerable consideration during the discussions was the matter of Federal health grants, both those in existence and those proposed, with all final decisions regarding the suggested new grant being left entirely to Provincial authorities.

The guest speaker for the closing luncheon was Hon. Paul Martin, Federal Minister of Health, who referred in very complimentary terms to the assistance given by the Federal Government by Dr. MacMillan in the matter of instituting health grants in this Province. Dr. MacMillan, former Premier and Leader of the Progressive Conservative Opposition in the Provincial Legislature here, was also the first Minister of Health. During his visit west he was accompanied by Mrs. MacMillan.

New Gas Mask For Cold Weather

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's defence research board has perfected a new-type gas-mask which doesn't "fog up" as conventional masks do in cold weather.

A board official who didn't want his name used said Tuesday the mask solves the two major problems encountered by conventional masks in sub-zero temperatures.

The eye-pieces of the conventional mask start fogging when the temperature drops below freezing. The fogging gets worse as the temperature goes down as the mask becomes almost unworkable at sub-zero temperatures.

Moreover, breath moisture condenses in the mask's outlet valve and freezes, closing the valve. The new mask, the official said, solves the first problem by a special feature in interior design. Just what the feature is, he could not say. That is secret information.

The second problem is solved by having the moisture collect in an outside container. This freezes and can be knocked free without disturbing the outlet valve.

The official said the mask is a Canadian innovation which may eventually be used by the United Kingdom and other Commonwealth troops. The United States is working on its own Arctic gas masks.
