

NEWFOUNDLAND.

From an authentic source we are enabled to give a statement of the precise quantity of seals landed at the port of St. John's, N. F. during the past Spring. It appears that 175 vessels have discharged 346,718 seals, being an average of 1981 fish for each, the average value being ten shillings for each seal, in all £173,359.

The Roman Catholic Cathedral has presented within the week a most imposing spectacle; the Right Rev. Dr. Mullooh having there administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to no fewer than 2006 of the Catholic Population, on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. Of this large assemblage, 1450 were females, and 1246 males.

During the previous fortnight the Bishop and Clergy had been unremittingly engaged in instructing and preparing this vast number of the congregation for the reception of one of the greatest Sacraments of the Catholic Church; and it must have been a source of ineffable gratification to his Lordship and fellow-labourers in this holy work to witness, in the Christian-like deportment of all who presented themselves on the occasion, their deep sense of the sacredness of the duty they had come to perform.

Troy, Terbay; Rev. T. Waldron, King's Cove; Rev. P. Ward, Tilton Harbour; Rev. W. Forristal, Placentia; Rev. J. Murphy, Ferryland; Rev. T. O'Connor, Portugal Cove.

The solemn and interesting ceremony of a reception took place at the Presentation Convent, of this town, on Monday morning last, when Miss Mullally, of Bonavista, received the white veil of the order from the hands of the Right Rev. Dr. Mullooh.

UNITED STATES.

A large body of men at New Orleans, about to embark for Cuba, immediately disbanded when they heard of the flight of Lopez.—A severe thunder storm has been experienced at Savannah, and a young lady was killed by lightning.—Father Matthew was at Natchez 23rd ult., where he is to remain for ten days as guest of Bishop Chanche.—45,948 passengers arrived at New York during the past month. The Delaware State Agricultural Society has protested against Canadian Reciprocity. It is said that the robbers of the Dorchester Bank have been arrested in Boston.

PATENT HOOPS.—The following may be found to possess some interest for our enterprising coopers:—

A machine has lately been invented for making hoops, which bids fair to do away with the necessity of growing hoop-poles. Any tough, straight-grained timber will answer the purpose. It is first sawed into square strips, the width desired for the hoop; the strips are next turned round, like a hoe handle, and then split through the centre. Each strip thus makes two round hoops. They are then steamed and bent—casks hooped with them present an extra neat appearance. The whole work is done by machinery. Just previous to setting them it is necessary to wet them in cold water. A specimen of these hoops was exhibited at the late State Agricultural show at Syracuse.—Syracuse Journal.
