Although neighbors quickly gathered their efforts were in vain and the building was destroyed with almost all its contents. The occupants escaped without difficulty.

REVIEW OF 1950 IN O'LEARY & VICINITY

Once again we have seen the last leaf of the old calendar destroyed and a new one taking its place. The year 1950 has gone back again into Eternity. For the people of O'Leary and vicinity, it has been an eventful year. There were several bad fires during the past year. On January 17th, a six thousand dollar fire completely destroyed the plant of the Western Woodwork Co. owned by O'Leary owned by Allison Horne and Son. For a time it threatened the Hammer Mill of Herbert Vatcher and the Verdun Theater owned by Milton Smallman and Son but efforts of the fire fighters saved both these buildings.

The most destructive fire occurred on March 6th, on Royal Avenue in O'Leary, when the big Government garage and snowplow burned and were a total loss, estimated, unofficially at about \$25,000. The snowplow operator, Dermot MacLean of Milo, had narrow escape. On Sept. 15th, the barn buildings of William MacDonald of Milo were destroyed but the home and adjacent buildings were saved.

The first of the two most destructive fires, because of the loss of human life, was on August 25th, when the young child of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Boyles of West Devon was fatally burned in the fire which destroyed their home. Another child was very seriously burned but survived. A young sixteen year old, Robert Gaudet, who was keeping house was the hero of the tragedy as he carried out of the burning building the little child which lived and the one who died. He was badly burned himself and was for many months under medical care but survived due to the care of Mrs. Alice Turner of the Turner Nursing Home in O'Leary and Dr. L. G. Dewar of O'Leary. On Oct. 26th, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. William Bartie of Alberton was fatally burned, at Alberton.

During 1950 the district in common with the rest of the Province experienced three very severe storms. On April 8th, the Province was blanketed by the severest Eastern snowstorm in many years. On August 10th, Prince County especially was hit by a severe electric storm. On Dec. 18th, the first real severe snowstorm occurred and disrupted communications, light service etc. In O'Leary the Canadian Legion hauled up a most convenient and commodious Hall from the airport at Mount Pleasant. It is splendidly equipped and centrally located and is a fine addition to the facilities of the town.

O'Leary has played host to the meeting of the new Retail Merchants Association and to the Prince County Federation of Agriculture during the year as well as to other gatherings.

A new Masonic Lodge has been opened and dedicated at O'Leary. The various organizations such as the Women's Institutes, the young peoples groups, the Canadian Girls in Training, the Boy Scouts and the Wolf Cubs and the different church organizations all enjoyed a successful year.

In the religious life of O'Leary the most momentous event were the two day services in the spacious O'Leary United Church conducted by the renowned Evangelist Rev. Charles B. Templeton. Over one thousand people from many different sections of Prince County crowded the church or listened to the services outside in means of loud speakers. In the West Prince Rev. Mr. Templeton also spoke to overflowing congregations at the Montrose and Alberton United Churches and many from O'Leary crowded the huge Forum at Charlottetown on July 31st., to hear his farewell address. It was estimated there were over 6000 persons in attendance. Great credit is due Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy of Charlottetown, chairman of the P.E.I. Presbytery of the United Church who was instrumental in securing the services of Rev. Mr. Templeton. His campaign swept P.E.I. like a fairie fire. No church building was large enough to hold the crowds so the meetings were held in rinks, theaters etc. Besides Charlottetown the Evangelist conducted services in the Montague area, the Bedouque district and the Alberton-O'Leary districts.

A very successful Church Vacation School was held in the O'Leary United Church and was conducted by Miss Ann MacLeod of Glace Bay, N.S. and Miss Evelyn Underhay of Bay Fortune, P. E. I.

Rev. L. M. Murray of the Kensington United Church held a very successful School for Rural Church Organists and Chorus at the O'Leary United Church and organists were present from most sections of Prince County and represented all the Protestant Churches. As an aftermath of that fine conference, a "Hymn Festival" was held in the O'Leary United Church on Sunday night Dec. 17th, in which the following choirs took part, Knutsford Baptist, St. Luke's Anglican, Bloomfield United and O'Leary United and the church was jammed to the very doors. It was the first time such a "Hymn Festival" or School for Organists has been held in O'Leary. It is hoped to have other "Hymn Festivals" in the near future.

As usual the Angel of Death was busy during 1950 and many of the older people heard the Call to Higher Service, but "they being dead yet speaketh." During the year the young child of Mr. and Mrs. William Shields of Howland, only a few miles from O'Leary was accidentally killed when the wheel of wagon went over his body.

In our neighboring community of Coleman Harold Bryenton lost his barn by fire but the house was saved and the barn has now been rebuilt.

Charles Read of Coleman, a young war veteran, a graduate of Prince of Wales College in Char-

lottetown and MacDonald College in Quebec won the coveted I.O.D.E. Scholarship for the province of P. E. I. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilmot G. Read of Coleman. His sister, Miss Gloria Read, an honor graduate of Prince of Wales College also won a Scholarship on entering Mount Allison University in Sackville, N.B. A new principal, William Turner of O'Leary, school during the term of O'Leary school during 1950 and has given splendid service. He succeeded the former successful principal, Lewis MacKenzie. O'Leary was happy to have the other members of the very efficient teaching staff return again, namely Mrs. Mae Palmer, Mrs. John Matthews and Miss Pearl Craig. After giving three years of splendid service as the Minister of the O'Leary Church of the Nazarene, Rev. H. M. Burgess and family left for Oxford, N.S. Besides their Church farewell, they were tender a community party and were the recipients of several gifts. A successor has not yet been appointed.

A number of the young men from O'Leary and district have entered the armed services of our Country and more will follow during 1951. Mr. Peter N. Pate of O'Leary has been appointed as director of Civilian Defence for the Province, serving under Hon. Mr. Arsenault, Minister of Civilian Defence, and he has given splendid service, making a survey of the Province and has contacted some 80 communities and organized committees for civilian defence. As they face the New Year, the residents of O'Leary and district do so with confidence, and are prepared to work, to pray, to sacrifice, that the menace of Communism might be driven from the earth. They realize that today the decision is between Communism and Christianity and the issue is whether the white races or the colored races of the world shall prevail.

Health Centre At Tyne Valley Nears Completion

Work on the construction of the new Stewart Memorial Health Centre at Tyne Valley is nearing completion. It will serve the people of Tyne Valley, Bigford, Port Hill, Ellerslie and is to be dedicated to the memory of the late Dr. J. A. Stewart, who had served that community all during his professional life. The hospital will have three private rooms and two semi-private with a six-cubicle nursery. It will fill a long-felt want in this locality. Grants of \$7,000 were received from the Federal and Provincial Governments and the sum of \$5,493.60 was raised by public subscription. The Women's Institute is to supply the furnishings.

The over all dimensions of the building are 68 X 34 feet. It is of frame construction, and completely fireproof throughout. It is a two story bungalow type structure with the main floor and staff quarters, kitchen, laundry etc. on the main floor. There will be thoroughly modern toilet equipment and shower baths, in keeping with the requirements of such an institution. The staff quarters will include: a doctor's examining room, which

will be most modern equipped, also a combined case and emergency room and a public health nurse's office. The area to be served comprises 21 school districts, residents of which have all subscribed to the project. This area extends from Grand River on the north and from one side of the Island to the other.—S.
