

Animal Welfare Counts

Three charges of cattle theft were heard last night at the preliminary hearing of Charles William Macquarrie, South St. Johns. The accused was committed for trial on two of the charges but discharged on a third.

Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, found that sufficient evidence had been presented to have the accused committed to trial in Supreme Court on a charge of possessing a red and white Shorthorn heifer from the farm of Mrs. Albert Linn, Brackley Beach, and a cow of possessing a black and white Holstein steer from the farm of Preston Cadmore, Winkler.

On a charge of possessing a grey Holstein steer belonging to Leith Andrews, Milton, the accused was discharged when the magistrate ruled that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant trial.

Representing the Crown was Alan K. Scates while Bert Campbell was counsel for the defence.

Giving evidence in all three cases was Knud Jorgensen, Fredericton, who brought animals from the accused which whose farm the plaintiffs identified their missing animals. It was stated in testimony that two of the animals in question were the same as Jorgensen had brought from the accused.

Other witnesses were: Leith Andrews, Milton; David Ling, Brackley Beach; Mrs. Albert Ling, Brackley Beach; Preston Cadmore, Winkler; and Capt. James Brooks, Charlottetown RCMP.

Ball for the accused was set at \$2,000.

In asking for the grant of bail, Defence Counsel Campbell pointed out that granting bail would be in order considering the present state of overcrowding at the jail.

More than 25 persons were present in the courtroom gallery.

Gov't Urged Vacate Construction Field

Thomas A. Somerville, Toronto, president of the Canadian Construction Association, said yesterday that provincial and municipal governments who were in the construction business should "vacate the field and accept the competitive tendering system."

Mr. Somerville, addressing a joint meeting of the P. E. I. Builders' Exchange and the P. E. I. Road Builders' Association, said that construction work can be done more economically by private companies than by government departments and public bodies, including hospitals and school boards.

Mr. Somerville, currently making a Maritime tour that includes stops in Halifax, Saint John and Fredericton, said that the Canadian Construction Association recommends that the tenders for all projects be called publicly, be opened publicly, and the contract for the job awarded to the lowest competent bidder.

He noted that most provincial governments, the federal government, and most Canadian cities, use this public tender system with success.

Well Known Life Insurance Man, J. Eric Shephard Dies

J. Eric Shephard, well known life insurance man of Charlottetown died suddenly Monday morning at the P.E.I. Hospital after a few days illness.

Mr. Shephard had suffered a heart attack several years ago, he had been in comparatively good health for some time and active in business and with other interests.

Mr. Shephard who was in his 52nd year was born at Musquoddy, N.B. a son of the late James and Ellen Shephard.

He came to Charlottetown in 1955 to assume management of the Charlottetown branch of the Mutual Life Assurance Company which position he held at the time of his death.

Mr. Shephard was active in church and community life, a man of strong convictions he gave his best to every cause which he believed deserved his support. He was a devout member of St. Paul's Anglican Church and had served on the vestry and with the laymen's association.

He was treasurer of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Bible Society, a member of St. John's Lodge No. 1, A.F. and AM, a member of the Life Underwriters Association, 1st of the Canadian Club and the Charlottetown Club.
