

Local and Other Items.

No crossing at the Capes to-day. The reports of the meeting in Ward 3 are too lengthy.

The "Northern Light," owing to heavy ice was obliged to return to Georgetown yesterday afternoon.

Five ships, with cargoes of British Columbia salmon, valued at \$1,000,000, are now on their way to England.

Three hundred thousand dollars have been paid by American capitalists for a mine in the Lake of the Woods district, Manitoba.

Exclusive of the Chinese, 100,000 persons have settled in Canada during 1882. This is more than three times as many as in 1881.

His Grace, the Archbishop-elect, His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, and Clergy left Cape Tormentine for Anbrest, this morning.

A Winnipeg dispatch says that last year the C. P. Railway carried 255,441 passengers and 109,164 pieces of baggage without loss or accident.

An Ottawa woman named Bond, aged thirty-three, has obtained a verdict for \$2,000 against a widower named Woodhouse for breach of promise.

WILLIAM BUCKNELL, of Philadelphia, has just given \$100,000 to the University of Lewistown, Pa. Mr. R. has given \$545,600 to church and missionary purposes since 1851.

OVER \$11,000 were realized at an auction sale of stocks at Halifax on Friday last. The prices obtained being good. HEAVY DAMAGES.—The case of Miss Mary Alice Almont Livingston against Mr. Henry Fleming, President of the New York Heating Company, for \$75,000 damages, for betrayal and breach of promise of marriage, was given to the jury in New York on Thursday last. After being out an hour the jury returned a verdict for the full amount. It is said to be the largest damages ever given in a United States Court.

THE EARNINGS.—The St. Lawrence Marine Insurance Association of Pictou N. S., pays dividends of one hundred dollars per share this year, and adds an amount to the rest account that nearly doubles it. The Chubasco Marine Railway Co. of Dartmouth declared a half-yearly dividend of four per cent and a bonus of fifty cents per share, making ten per cent for the year. A sum of \$10,000 is added to the rest account.

No. 1 BATTERY P. E. Island Brigade of Garrison Artillery have again carried off the shifting ordnance prizes given by the Dominion Artillery Association of Canada. The Battery have now won four out of the five shifting ordnance competitions which have been held since the organization of the Association—three of them consecutively. These competitions are open to the whole Garrison Artillery of Canada; and we think it speaks volumes for the drill and efficiency of this Battery, when it can succeed in carrying off these prizes, against competitors, who have much greater facilities, and advantages—as, for instance, in the large cities of Toronto, Montreal, Quebec, and Halifax—and certainly entitles it to the distinction of ranking as the crack Artillery corps of the Dominion. The Kingston Cadets have, we see, done the same shift in one minute and fifteen seconds, thus beating them by one minute and twenty seconds (No. 1 Battery's time being two minutes and thirty-five seconds). But this is not a fair comparison, for it must be remembered that these young gentlemen, being to all intents and purposes a permanent corps, have regular hours and times for drill, when every member of the detachment can attend, and make himself perfect in the duties he has been selected to perform; and further our Battery were rather unfortunate in having the gun to come in its carriage wrong-side-up, which necessitated its being allowed until the next evening to be put right. We congratulate the Capt. Passmore on the success of the Battery in his command, and trust that, should another Canadian team be sent to such a battery, it will number among its members several of this crack corps. The prizes consist of a money prize of twenty dollars to the detachment, and a gold embroidered badge and a silver cup, presented by the Governor General to the Commanding Officer.

Entertainment at Tryon.

A grand literary and musical entertainment was held at North Tryon School-house, on the evening of the 13th January, under the direction of Miss Fowler. She was ably assisted by Miss Pooley, Miss Morrison, and Miss Boynton. Several other ladies and gentlemen took a prominent part. Recitation, dialogues, and singing were excellent. Miss Fowler conducted the music. The greater part of the audience were greatly disappointed on account of the choicest comic songs, which, no doubt, would have been very comical. Prof. J. H. Smith is quite a distinguished orator, and is well known throughout the Province of P. E. Island. At the close the Professor was going to deliver an essay on his Satanic Majesty, and music from his Automatic Organette Fort. The best of order prevailed till the close, when several young men refused to quit the building, and a little disturbance took place. Quite a number endeavored to quell the disturbance; but met with little success, until Captain Ives threatened to call out the Volunteer force of Tryon.
